knew Young was always armed and had avoided meeting the man or having any trouble with him as much as possible.

Utters Threat
Saturday night Mezzini walked to the filling station and as he was turning in the driveway Young grabbed him by the arm at the same time telling Mezzini he was going to "get him," bystanders reported.

According to the story Mezzini who was much bigger than Young, pushed the latter away in hopes of avoiding a scene. Young followed him, however, and hot words resulted. The bitterness grew and the two men began to battle, Mezzini soon having Young pinned on his back on the ground.

"Don't reach for your gun, Young," Mezzini was heard to say as he held Young's arm. "We don't want any more trouble."

Shoots Mezzini

A few more words followed and then Mezzini thinking that all was well relaxed his hold on Young and turning around started to walk away. Immediately Young jumped to his feet, produced his gun and fired, the shot entering the left side of Mezzini.

The wounded man groaned, grabbed a piece of rubber hose and made a lunge for Young. Two more shots fired in rapid succession and Mezzini dropped to the ground, both of the bullets having struck.

In the excitement Young dashed away and no one followed because the man was armed.

Several of the bystanders rushed to Mezzini where he was lying on the ground. The wounded man was placed in a machine and rushed to the Fort Sheridan hospital where he died an hour later.

Said "I Got Him"

Chief Frame visited Young's lodgings at the home of Louis Mazzetti, and was told by the landlord that shortly after the shooting Young had come in the house shouting "I got him," and then with a few clothes in one hand he had hurriedly picked up dashed from the house and disappeared. He was traced to Chicago by Chief Frame, who has spent much time on the case, but so far the man has eluded arrest.

The fugitive is described as five feet six inches tall, dark complexion, about 35 years old, short hair, and a cut on left side of his nose. Young when last seen had on a blue shirt, dark trousers, and was wearing a black fedora hat. Yung recently had been in the employ of John E. Fitzgerald, plumbing and heating contractor at Lake Forest. He lived at Highwood, having come here from a southern Illinois mining region, near Danville.

Large Funeral

The funeral of Eugene Mazzeni, which was held at St. James church, Highwood, on Monday, was one of the largest ever seen in that city, with fully one hundred automobiles in line, it is reported. He was one of the city's well-to-do and progressive residents with a good business and a host of warm friends, and there is deep regret at his death, mingled with deep sympathy for the widow and her two children by a former marriage, Olga, 22, and Emil, 20, who comprise the Mezzini family. Mr. Mezzini also had many friends in Highland Park, who extend sympathy. Friends here recall his fine singing, with a splendid tenor voice.
