Jesus answered them, I told you, and ye believed not: the works that I do in my Father's name, they bear witness of me. If I do not the works of my Father, believe me not. But if I do, though ye believe not me, believe the works; that ye may know, and that ye may know, and believe, that the Father is in me, and I in him." (John 10:23-25, 37, 38).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Jesus represented Christ, the true idea of God Christ presents the indestructible man, whom Spirit creates, constitutes, and governs. Christ illustrates that blending with God, his divine Principle, which gives man dominion over all the earth" (p. 316).

Griex and Leon Rothier will be the elder, DesGriex. Mr. Hasselmanns will conduct. The "Aida" scene will bring Mme. Rethberg to the title role, with Mr. Martinelli as Radames, Mr. Danise as Amonasro, Mme. Bourskaya as Amneris and Mr. Rothier as Ramfis. Mr. Papi will conduct. The second act of "The Love of the Three Kings" will be presented with Mme. Bori as Flora, Mr. Johnson as Avito, Mr. Basiola as Manfredo and Mr. Lazzari as Archibaldo. Miss Paggi and Mr. Mojica will likewise be in the cast. Mr. Papi will conduct. The success attained by all of these artists in the various roles assigned them in this gala, is matter of Ravinia history. Suffice it, that in these roles they are called upon for a full display of their talents, and they have met these demands time and again.

Double Bill Saturday
An unusual double bill is announced for Saturday night, Sept. 4, when "Pagliacci" will be given in response to the demands which have swamped the management since its first presentation. "La Navarraise," not given heretofore this season, will be presented in conjunction with it. The first "Pagliacci" performances attracted one of the largest audiences that has assembled at Ravinia this year, and that filled every seat in the opera house and every available inch of standing room as well. The same cast will be heard on Saturday night, Sept. 4. Mme. Rethberg again being cast as Nedda, in which her voice shows to unusual advantage. Mr. Martinelli will be Canio, a part which with its great dramatic moments is one of the finest in the list of this tenor. The part of Tonio will be sung by Giuseppe Danise, who makes the singing of the "Prologue" an outstanding performance. Mr. Mojica will be heard as Beppe and Mr. DeFrere as Silvio. Mr. Papi will conduct.

"La Navarraise" "La Navarraise," one of the most compact and dramatic of the shorter operas, will follow "Pagliacci" and Mme. Bourskaya, who has been heard in this role at Ravinia in seasons past, will sing the name part, which makes heavy demands for vocalization and acting. Mario Chamlee will be heard in the principal tenor role of Araquil in which his splendid lyric voice will show to splendid advantage. It is of interest that Mr. Chamlee has never sung this role before. Leon Rothier, as General Garrido, has a magnificent part in this opera which demands the finished style for which this basso is noted. Others in the cast are Mr. D'Angelo, Mr. Mojica, Mr. Ananian and Mr. Derman. Mr. Hasselmanns will conduct.

On Sunday night, Sept. 5, that beloved Bizet opus, "Carmen," will be given, this time with Mme. Bourskaya in the title role, while Edward Johnson will be heard as Don Jose. Mme. Bourskaya's vivid impersonation of the cigarette girl is well known to Ravinia audiences, while Mr. Johnson is ideally fitted to the emotional part of the betrayed soldier. Mr. Basiola will have excellent opportunity as Escamillo, the treader. Miss Luella Melius will be Micaela, a part that offers every chance for splendid singing. Others in the cast are Miss Maxwell, Miss Falco, Mr. Mojica, Mr. D'Angelo and Mr. Ananian. "La Flamenco" will be danced by Miss Ruth Page. Mr. Pelletier will conduct.

Brilliant Finals
The season will be brought to a climactic close on Monday night, Sept. 6, with another gala performance of unusual brilliancy. Again Ravinia's choicest talent will appear and again the works presented will provide roles in which they are internationally famous. For this occasion Mr. Eckstein has selected the Harbor and Plains scenes from "Manon Lescaut"—these being the second and third acts from this Puccini opera—and the first and second scenes from the third act of "Lohengrin." In the two acts from "Manon Lescaut," Mme. Bori will be heard in the title role and Mr. Martinelli will be DesGriex. This will mark the season's farewell of these artists. Others who will appear in the "Manon" scenes are Mme. Bourskaya, Mr. Mojica, Mr. DeFrere, Mr. D'Angelo, Mr. Ananian and Mr. Coscia. Mr. Papi will conduct. The "Lohengrin" scenes will present Mme. Rethberg as Elsa while Mr. Johnson will be heard in the title role, and in this work these Ravinia favorites will sing their valedictory for the season, leaving behind many friends who have been warmly appreciative of their work. In "Lohengrin" Miss Gentle will be heard as Ortrud, Mr. D'Angelo as the King and Mr. Fantini as Telramund. Mr. Hasselmanns will conduct.
