The West Ridge school is being enlarged by the addition of another class room and work shop. Miss Wright and Miss Munro will both return to their work at West Ridge for the coming year.

At Lincoln school there are several changes. Mr. Borg, who has been in charge of manual training for five years, will resume his work at Stout Institute at Menominee, Wis. His successor will be Mr. Berggren, a graduate of Stout, who has been teaching in Detroit for the past three years. Miss Lund, who has had charge of the music at Lincoln, will also take up further study. Miss Elizabeth Madden, a graduate from the school of music at the University of Wisconsin, will teach the music this year. Miss Ruth Thomas, who has been teaching at Shorewood, near Milwaukee, for the past nine years, will take Miss Laura Paullin's place in sixth grade. Ravinia School

At Ravinia Mr. Howard Cupp, who has been in charge of playground work in Chicago, will have charge of the physical education and manual training. Miss Leta Reed, a graduate of Chicago Teachers college, who has had her experience in Kalamazoo and Hammond, will have charge of first grade. Miss Helen Harding of Chicago university, who has taught in the Summit school for girls, St. Paul, and in Wilmette, will succeed Miss Hughes as teacher of English in the upper grades. The new building at Ravinia is completed and will be used from the beginning of school. High School Opens Sept. 7. The Deerfield-Shields township high school for Highland Park, Lake Forest and neighboring territory opens on Tuesday, Sept. 7. There is an advance registration of 812 students. This means that the total registration for the year will probably run around 900. Of the fifty regular members of the faculty, six only have terminated their service at the close of the past year. This compares favorably with the average turnover in the schools of the country which amounts to 33-1-3 per cent. Of the six, marriage claims one who will cease teaching; two go into college and university work; a fourth becomes director of a Y.W.C.A. with special duties in the interests of foreign students in the universities; a fifth was obliged to quit work before the end of the school year on account of ill health and she will rest for a year.

New Teachers

The new teachers are as follows: Mr. Joseph J. Davidson, from the Choate School at Wallingford, Conn., will teach English. Mr. Davidson is a graduate of Dartmouth, has taken an advanced course at Columbia and also studied at Harvard. He has had the experience as teacher at South Bend, Ind., Louisville, Ky., New Haven and Springfield Mass., and comes very highly recommended.

Miss Katherine Reid of Richmond, Ind., will also teach English. Miss Reid is a graduate of Lake Forest university where she made an excellent record and showed marked qualities of leadership among the students. While there, in her senior year, she substituted for a time at Deerfield-Shields successfully. Since graduating from Lake Forest she has had a year of graduate study in the Earlham college, and has taught in

the Richmond High School. Among those who recommend Miss Reid highly are Prof. Ford of the English department at Lake Forest, and President Herbert McComb Moore, Director of Dramatics.

Miss Zoe Comer will have charge of public speaking and dramatics. Miss Comer is a graduate of the University of Minnesota, has taught English and public speaking at Menominee, Wis., and has taken two years of graduate work in this field at the School of Speech at Northwestern, teaching meanwhile at the Boltwood Junior high school. All of her testimonials are of the very highest.

Miss Edith Parry, teacher of physical education and acting dean of women at Rockford college, will have charge of the girls' physical education. Miss Parry is a graduate of Deerfield-Shields and of the Chicago Normal School of Physical Education, and of Rockford college. She was given first place among the graduates of the Chicago Normal School in rating for the position by the head of the school who says: "In my judgment there could be no finer teacher nor lovelier personality and influence." President Maddox of Rockford college is equally enthusiastic.

Miss Parry's assistant in the physical education department is Miss Elizabeth Keller of Grand Rapids, Mich. Miss Keller is a graduate of the Western State Normal college, at Kalamazoo, Mich., and of the American College of Physical Education at Chicago. She has made a remarkable record while in charge of one of the playgrounds and gymnasium work maintained by the South Park commissioners in Chicago. She is a young woman of very great energy and enthusiasm.

Three Teachers Marry

Three women teachers are returning with a change of name in the coming year, having married during the summer. Miss Mildred Wiley will be Mrs. Frank B. Peers, Miss Lois Hodges will return as Mrs. Colin Sanborn, and Miss Dilla Whittemore the librarian, will return as Mrs. A. G. MacBean.

Grade Grounds

The grounds just north of the school which for so long have been allowed to settle have now been graded and are being made ready as a playground. It is expected that this will be used at noon-time instead of the sidewalks and roads for volley ball, handball and other games. The noon periods will be lengthened to 37 minutes including the passing time, instead of 30 minutes as last year. The free period in the morning has been reduced to 12 minutes in order to lengthen the recitation periods and the noon period. With longer recitation periods a larger amount of work can be done in class under the teacher's supervision. Arrangements have been made to take care of the club activities, glee clubs, etc., at other periods of the day.
