

**GREAT RADIO SHOW
CHICAGO, SEPT. 27**

CONTINUES TO OCTOBER 2

First Opportunity to View the New Models and Get Latest Information Regarding Reception, Etc.

Radio fans of the mid-west and particularly of Chicago will join with manufacturers and dealers from all over the country in dedicating the 1927 radio season the latter part of this month with the opening of the National Radio Exposition, September 27, at the Exhibition hall, Hotel Sherman. The show will be held from September 27 to October 2 and will be the official radio dealers show of the year.

The first opportunity of the season to view the latest models and radio parts will turn an early spotlight on the country's fastest growing industry and, from present indications, more than two hundred of the latest models of the leading radio manufacturers will be on exhibition at the show.

Better Service Keynote
"Better service for the radio fans, both from the manufacturers and dealers and from the broadcasting stations, will be the keynote of this year's show," Milo E. Westbrook, general manager of the exposition announced today. "The fans are responsible for the \$5,000,000,000 industry that radio has become and discussions held during the show will be along the lines of better service and reception."

One feature of this year's show will be an open forum to be conducted by the Broadcast Listeners' association of America, Frank H. McDonald, president, which will take up such serious problems confronting radio listeners as the over-crowded air-lanes, the "bloopers" nuisance, and pirating stations. At the present time there seems to be no definite move going forward to check the threatened chaotic condition of the air and the Broadcast Listeners hope that some beneficial results may come from the forum.

Amateur Set Building
As usual, the latest developments in amateur set building are expected to materialize in the national set build-

ing contest for boys. Each year since 1921 has seen definite and unusual results turned out by such groups as the Lane high school boys radio group so that some new departures may be expected in this year's show.

Still another feature of the show will be the popularity contest to determine which radio entertainer or announcer is the most popular with the fans. Last year there was much spirited competition in this contest and even keener rivalry is expected in this year's contest as it will be national in scope. The winner will be decided by popular vote.

COUNTRY DAY SCHOOL TO ERECT BUILDING

To Start Immediately on Building of Auditorium; Approve Insurance

After the board meeting of the North Shore Country Day school held last week, the important announcement was made that the contracts are being let now, and work will begin immediately on the new school auditorium structure.

The board also approved the faculty insurance plan which is in effect in many private schools in the country. This plan is backed by the Carnegie Foundation fund. The school pays half and the teachers pay half, much as the war risk insurance was conducted by the government during the war. This insurance serves as a pension.

The new through highway to extend west of a parallel with the North Western railroad is slicing close to the football field used by the Country Day school. While the road does not actually encroach upon the field, it runs too close for safety, so plans are being made to grade a new field on the hill, leaving the old full-sized field for practice purposes.

This new, full sized field will not be started until the digging is completed for the auditorium, as the field will be close to the new building. The girls' hockey field will not be disturbed by the construction of the building, or the new football field, it is said.

GLENCOE WOMEN IN WELFARE WORK

Good Results Being Obtained In This Philanthropy In Chicago

Glencoe women are doing splendid work at the Mary Crane Infant Welfare station in Chicago, according to reports of Mrs. J. M. Roberts, chairman of the station committee from the village. Infant Welfare babies have had a thriving summer and there is a great change in the babies' health, due to improved conditions, it is said. Pure, clean milk and preaching the sanitary gospel of cleanliness and the value of regular feeding have resulted in practically removing the old-time dreaded disease called "summer complaint." The Infant Welfare society has accomplished splendid results among the poor of Chicago by holding bi-weekly conferences, attended by a physician and visiting nurse. Great credit is also given to the follow-up work of the nurse, who makes friends of the families and shows them how to make the home a fit place for children. The greatly improved health of the babies indicates how carefully the mothers follow the instructions of the nurse and physician, it is said.

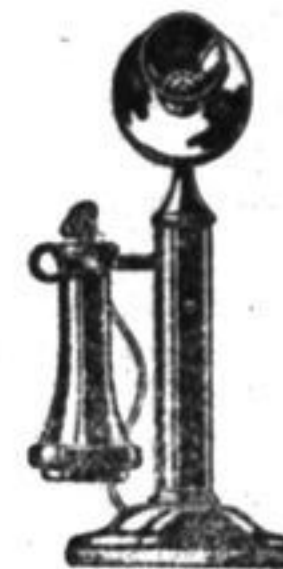
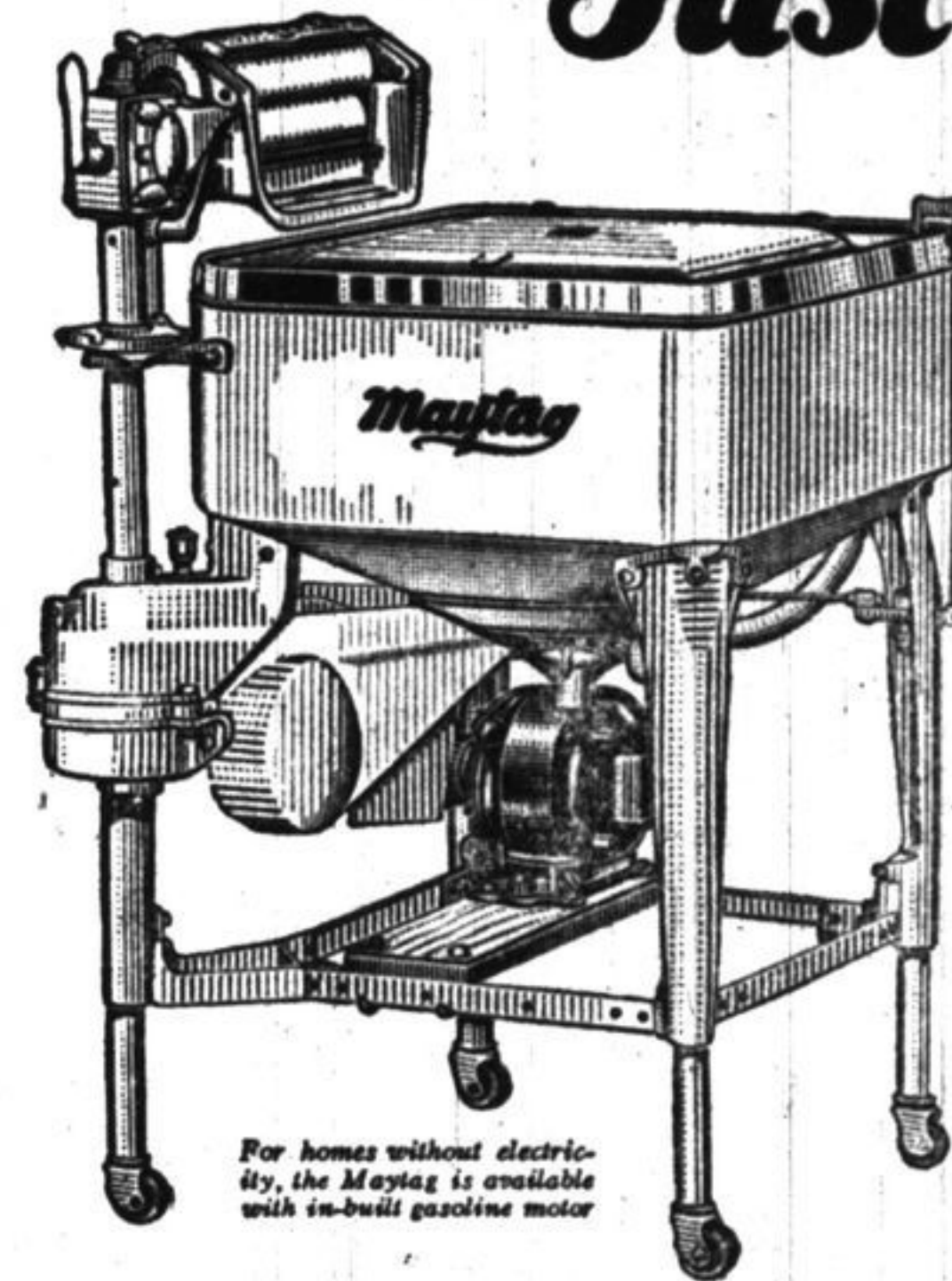
