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SAYS FACTS AGAINST U. S.-JAPANESE WAR

JAP STUDENT DISCUSSES
 Recent Arrival at Northwestern University Says Economic Conditions Preclude Such Conflict

All of the common-sense facts of hard, commercial sense stand in the way of war between Japan and the United States, according to Sterling H. Takeuchi, Japanese student who has arrived at Northwestern university to pursue his studies for a Ph.D. degree. Mr. Takeuchi is making a study of the Japanese-American relations and will take a special graduate course in political science at Northwestern. He gained the B.A. and M.A. degrees recently at the University of Texas and specialized there in the same study. He hails from Kobe, Japan, is a Christian, and is far from believing in Japanese militarism, or in any other brand of "soldier government." Yet he recognizes, he admits, the jarring notes that have occurred in the relationship of his native government and Uncle Sam.

Speaking of the oft-repeated and frequently-written charge that Japan will first attack the United States through the Philippines, Mr. Takeuchi says: "We all know that there are ten million people, different in religion, culture, language, and government in the Philippines, with rather scant natural resources. Furthermore, the Filipinos want independence. There has been no exclusion law in the Philippines, yet few Japanese are to be found there now. We know that the climate there is not to the liking of the Japanese. In the light of these facts, why would Japan want the islands?"

Regarding Philippines
 "Again the charge that the American-Japanese competition in trade in the far east will lead to war—do we not know that what America is able to supply to the seat, Japan is not, while what Japan is able to supply, America is not? America supplies iron, oil, cotton, coal and related materials that are indispensable for the industrialization of the far east, while Japan, lacking in these commodities, furnishes the world with silk, tea and toys. Why do we so often hear of the inevitableness of war?"

Economic Reasons

"If nothing else, the strong economic tie forbids us to go to war. America is the best customer of Japan, without whose patronage perhaps she would not be able to exist as a great industrial and commercial nation. On the other hand, the United States finds in Japan the best customer in the far east. Why should Japan desire to break this amicable relationship between the two nations merely to satisfy the jingoism of certain groups in each country?"

"The Washington conference made an offensive attack by one nation upon another a military impossibility. Japan is entirely deficient in carrying on any extensive naval operations 5,500 miles away from her home base,

PRICELESS RUG IN SESQUI EXHIBITION

Also Noted Tapestries in the Palace of Fine Arts at Philadelphia

The priceless rugs and tapestries on the walls of the Palace of Fine Arts at the Sesqui-Centennial International exposition, now being held in Philadelphia, include more than two-score which have passed the second century mark in age. Four rare tapestries, illustrating scenes from the wars of the Spanish Succession, were woven in 1700 and hung in the Spanish Palace until removed to the exposition for display.

MACHINE TO LAY BRICKS IS LATEST

Electric Device Which Lays Up to 1200 Bricks an Hour, Is Reported

An electric bricklaying machine which, it is claimed, lays 1,200 bricks an hour, is the latest application of electric energy to industry. Upon rails placed around the outside walls of a building, a traveling boom is set and upon this area the mortar tank and laying mechanism operated by a 3 horse power electric motor. The laying wheel rotates taking two bricks from the carrier, while another wheel spreads mortar as the carrier moves along the boom.

At the end of the wall the machine changes direction and proceeds as before until it has laid one row of bricks entirely around the building. The boom is then raised the thickness of one row and another trip begins.

and she has no such designs. American Peace-Loving
 "My five years of study in the United States has convinced me that the American people are fundamentally peace-loving and that America would be the last nation to engage in an aggressive war. Therefore, on all grounds from both a commercial and military standpoint, war between the two nations is out of the question."

Mr. Takeuchi has filled many speaking engagements in the United States, talking nearly always on Japanese-American relations, and now comes to Northwestern well equipped to form sound opinions on the subject in further research.
