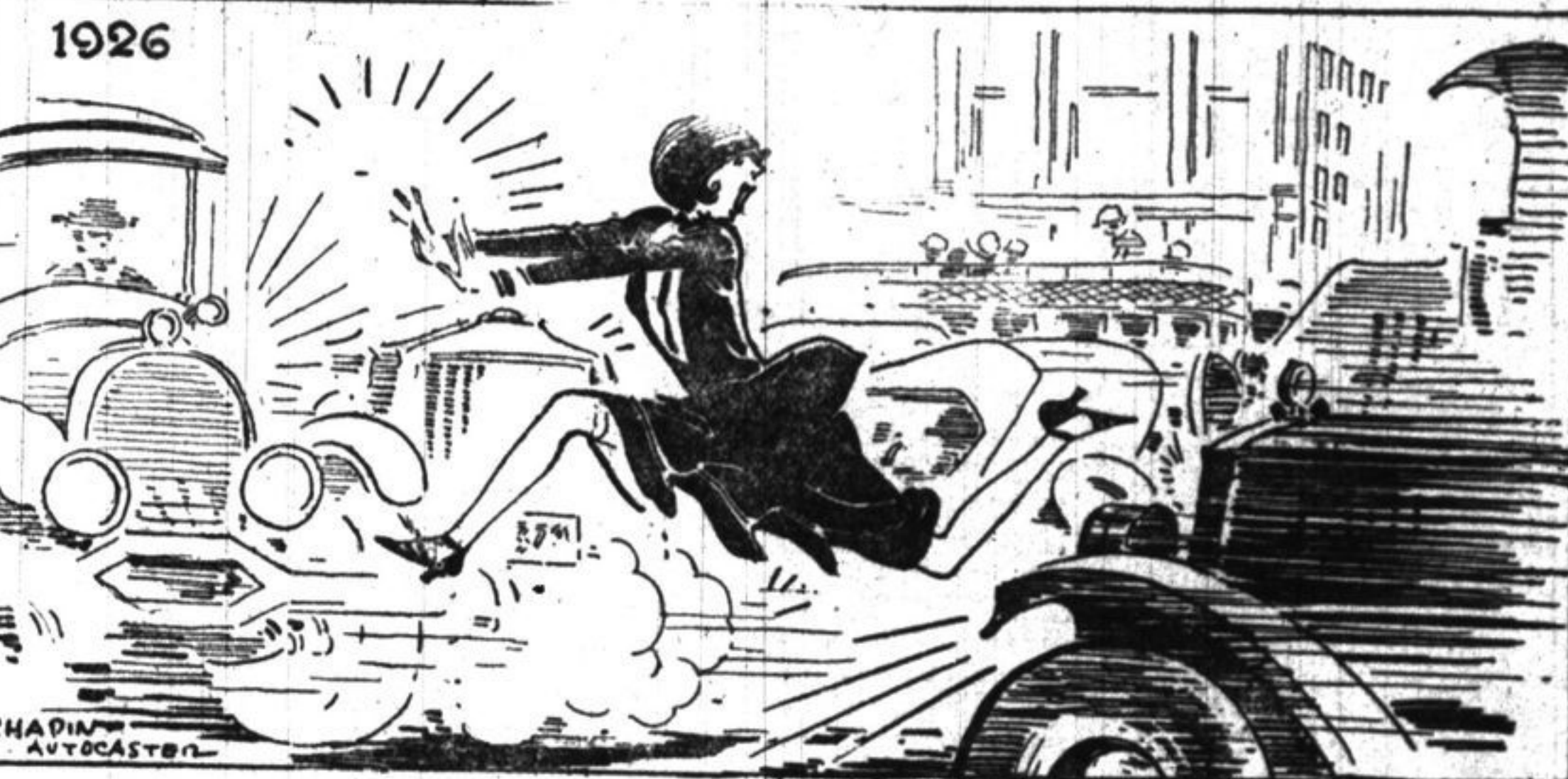
Rally—Rally—Rally.

COUNTY TAX LEVY SLIGHTLY REDUCED

JUDGES' SALARIES MORE
Depends on Result of Contest Over Constitutionality of Recent Boost By Legislature

The finance committee of the county board composed of supervisors Vercoe, Meyer and Austin recently submitted to the county board a report recommending a total appropriation of \$351,650 for general county purposes for the ensuing year and the report was adopted by a unanimous vote. Last year this appropriation was \$360,150, thus the new budget, which is for the fiscal year starting September 1, 1926 and extending through Aug. 31, 1927, shows a decrease of \$8,500.

The budget also provides an additional appropriation of \$29,175 for the detention home, bond payments and upkeep of county highways, but the revenue for these purposes comes from special taxes. The county clerk was directed to extend taxes in accordance with the law to get the needed revenue.

The budget provides for increases in salaries for County Judge Perry L. Persons, Probate Judge Martin C. Decker and Probate Clerk John Bullock. In connection with the increases in the salaries of these three officers and also the fixing of other salaries, which remain the same, a special report was made by a joint committee composed of members of the finance and fees and salaries committees, and adopted.

The budget provides that \$10,000 be set aside for the yearly salaries of Judges Decker and Persons, \$5,000 for each jurist. At the present time Judge Persons receives \$3,500 and Judge Decker \$2,800, so the budget provides for \$1,500 and \$2,000 increases, respectively.

The salaries as set, however, in the measure passed by the board fixes the salaries of Judges Person and Decker at \$3,500 each, thus the salary of the county judge will remain the same and the salary of the Probate judge will be increased \$700. The salary measure provides for an increase of \$700 for Probate Clerk Bullock, his salary being raised from \$2,800 to \$3,500. The increases will become effective on December 1.

Supervisor Vercoe, chairman of the finance committee, in explaining the complicated situation regarding salaries of Judges Persons and Decker stated that the legislature some months ago passed an act increasing the salaries of jurists of these courts from \$3,500 to \$4,000. Supervisor Vercoe said, however, that the constitution fixes these salaries at \$3,500 and no amendment to the constitution has been made and that a contest is to be waged in some county in the state. The sum appropriated for each jurist was made \$4,000 as this salary will have to be paid them if the contest fails to knock out the new salaries set by the act of the legislature.
