Germany is now a full fledged member of the international league but it may be some little time yet before the rest of them permit her to win the pennant.

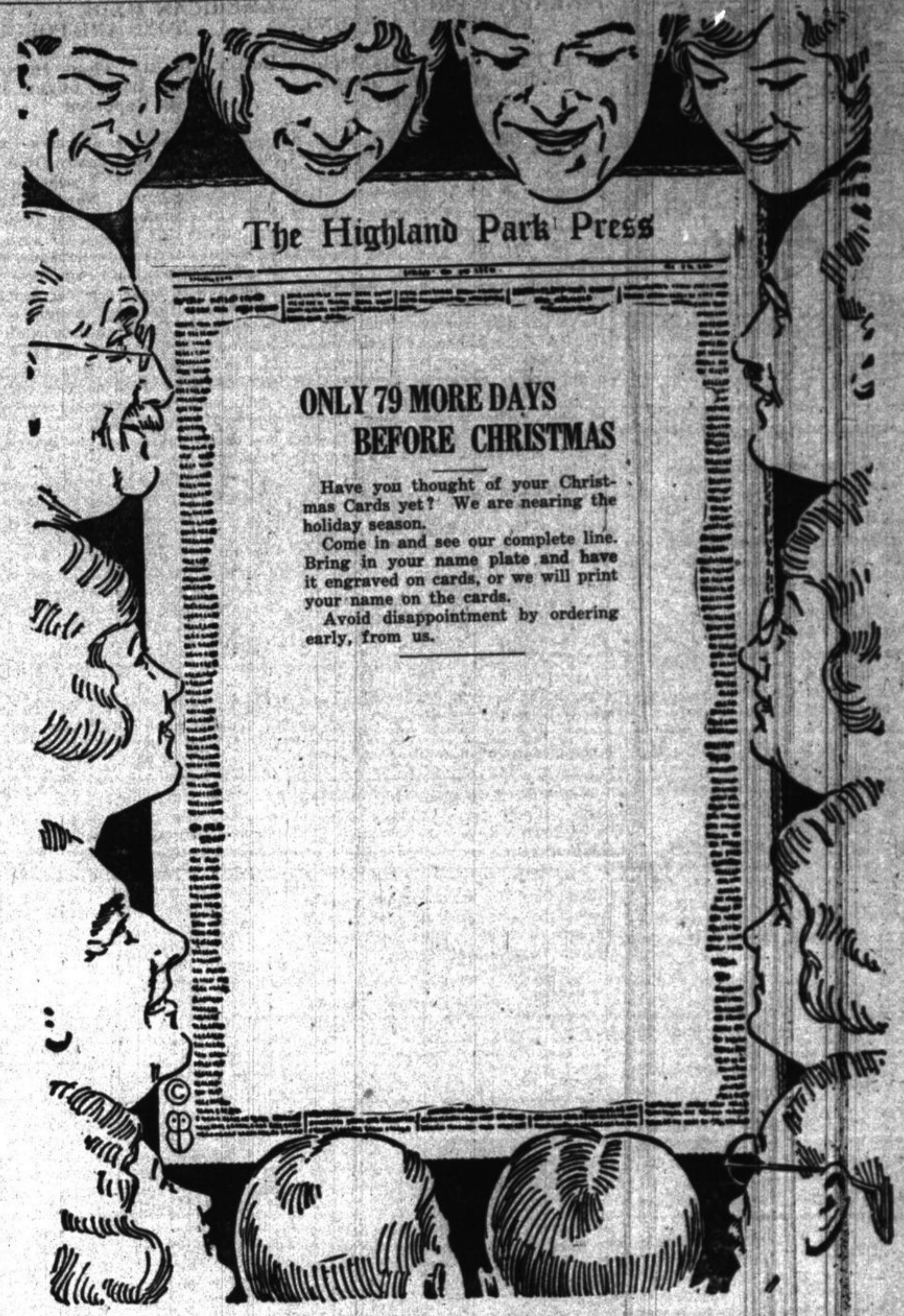
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
