EXPOSITION OPENING IS LARGELY ATTENDED

900 PRESENT FIRST DAY

Mayor Hastings Opens Affair with Address; Musical Program in Evening; Exhibit in Progress

More than four hundred people had gathered in the auditorium of the woman's club when the president, Mrs. Robert E. Seyfarth, gavel in hand, announced the formal opening of the Better American Homes Exposition.

In all the twelve years of his administration the members of the woman's club have felt that no public enterprise of theirs was quite complete without the presence of the mayor of Highland Park.

The mayor prefaced his remarks by saying that in his experience two great world's fairs came to mind—the Sesqui-centennial in Philadelphia, the fair at Jackson, Mississippi, and comparable with these is the Better American Homes exposition, except that in his thirty-one years of exposition attendance this was the only occasion where everything was in readiness at the appointed hour for opening.

H. K. COALE DEAD; WELL KNOWN HERE

NOTED ORNITHOLOGIST

Resident of Highland Park for Many Years and Prominent Realtor; Funeral to Be Saturday, 2 P. M.

Henry Kelso Coale, prominent realtor, honored citizen for over 30 years and ornithologist of national reputation, died at his home, 528 South Linden avenue about 4:15 o'clock Wednesday morning, following about two and a half weeks of illness.

Mr. Coale was born in Chicago February 28, 1868, a son of Isaac and Eliza Jane Kelso Coale, pioneer residents in that locality.

The son grew up in Chicago, attending the city schools and early interesting himself in nature study, especially being attracted by native birds, of which he early began a collection. His father was engaged in the coal and lumber business and he assisted in every way possible.

Field Museum Ornithologist

In the meantime his hobby of bird study and collecting had already won him recognition, and when the Field Museum was established after the World's fair he was its first ornithologist. Shortly after he removed to Highland Park, in 1893, and lived on Laurel avenue. Then he returned to Chicago for a year and finally settled in this city in 1894, engaging in the real estate business here.
