admiration. The ability shown in the building of this great structure, and the hard work that has been done in developing your organization to such an extent, command the respect and attention of the entire city.

"Your organization has done many things to aid in a better home life, a better city, and a better spirit of good will. Your watchful care over all the things that tend to detract from community life, has all been appreciated by the administration of the City of Highland Park.

"We have grown by leaps and bounds, and it has required a tremendous amount of work, and a great deal of time in order to keep moving along with the procession.

"This state and country are full of towns of two kinds—those that are going ahead and those that are falling behind. There is no medium. A town that is standing still has started back. A comparatively small number of persons regard the city as their opportunity to acquire either fortune or power. They seek to rule others for their own personal benefit. What this class lacks in numbers, they more than make up in adroitness, persistency and aggressiveness. They are the menace. Against them eternal vigilance must be exercised.

"Within our boundaries are to be found some of the very best people in the world, and then rubbing shoulders are some of the worst, but this I know, that for every bad citizen there are a hundred good ones. There are always plenty of fault finders who can see every time what ought to be done, but you seldom see them taking a hand in building up their own community. The kicker, the knocker, the slammer, create considerable clamor, but it's really true—you know it—you cannot saw wood with a hammer.

"Your exposition is a great educational piece of work. Here people will find all of the aids to making the home comfortable. Mechanical devices of every description, exhibits of every kind can be seen here, and an opportunity will be afforded our people to study them, become acquainted with them and ultimately secure them to aid in reducing the labor and drudgery of the most tiresome of all occupations—the daily grind of the home.

"All this work on the part of the woman's club of Highland Park is a labor of love, not only for the community but for their own organization. You have become a great factor in the civic life of this community. Our community is growing rapidly with a fine class of people that are coming from the great city on the south, and here in your midst is the opportunity for them to create a new home, make new friends and add to the pleasures and joys of living in a fine community.

"Chauncey M. Depew closed an address in the following words:  
 "From the hearth-stone around which linger the recollections of our mother, from the fireside where our wife awaits us, come all the purity, all the hope, and all the courage with which we fight the battle of life. The man who is not thus inspired, who labors not so much to secure the applause of the world as the solid and more precious approval of his home, accomplishes little of good for others or of honor for himself. I close with the hope that each of us may always have near us  
 "A perfect woman, nobly planned  
 To warn, to comfort, and command,  
 And yet a spirit still, and bright  
 With something of an angel light."

In the evening a most delightful musical program was rendered. Mr. B. Fred Wise, tenor, was the soloist for the evening. His numbers were arranged in two groups which were splendidly rendered and were heartily received by his audience.  
 The total attendance for the day was nine hundred. All day long the public visited the exposition, but the largest attendance was during the evening. The exposition is still in progress and will continue today and tomorrow.

**MRS. ALBERT SODMAN PASSED AWAY MONDAY**

Funeral Today (Thursday) at Her Home; Interment at Mooney's Cemetery

Mrs. Lillian Sodman, 800 Ashland avenue, Highwood, passed away Monday morning at the Highland Park hospital at three-thirty o'clock as the result of convulsions following the birth of a baby boy Sunday.

She was born in Highwood, January 10, 1901, and attended the public schools of Highland Park and Highwood. She worked as a telephone operator at the Highland Park office for about five years.  
 Thursday, August 21, 1919, Mr. Sodman and Mrs. Sodman were united in marriage and have lived in Highwood since then.

Mr. Sodman leaves to survive her, her husband, Albert, two daughters, Loraine and Cherie, and a son, Albert Jr.

Funeral services will be held from the home at two-thirty today (Thursday) with the Rev. Doble officiating and the interment will be in Mooney's cemetery.

**PUBLIC SERVICE CO. OPEN HOUSE SUCCESS**

More Than 21,000 Visitors at Plants During Last Week; Large Increase

More than 21,000 persons became better acquainted with the Public Service company of Northern Illinois by means of personal visits to the company's gas and electricity manufacturing plants during "open house week" October 4 to 9. This is more than three times as many as took advantage of "open house" opportunities last year.

Although Waukegan and Joliet, where the company's principal electrical generating stations are situated, attracted the largest individual parties of visitors, the 21,000 persons represented in fairly equal proportion, the 278 communities which are served by the company.

Charles W. Bradley, vice-president in charge of public relations and service, described the results of the company's second annual "open house week" as decidedly gratifying.

"Last year," said Mr. Bradley, "we felt pretty well satisfied, with a total attendance of approximately 7,000, as it was the company's initial venture in the "open house" idea. We learned last year that the general public is more interested than we had supposed, in the processes and equipment used in the manufacture of our commodities and resolved, therefore, to expend greater effort and more time in staging the project this year."

**WILLIAM FLOYD, FAMOUS COLONIAL**

Having his family mansion used as a barracks for cavalry and his live stock as food for the enemy were some of the hardships suffered during the Revolution by William Floyd, one of the New York signers of the Declaration of Independence. The one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the document is being celebrated by the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition in Philadelphia.

Floyd was a lover of the peace and contentment which comes of companionship with the soil. He was born in Brook Haven, New York, and died on a tract of land which he had purchased in its wild state and cleared for habitation. The tenor of the times drew him unwittingly into public life. He received little education but his clearness of mind and strength of character carried him far. He lived on his father's estate until he was sent to the First Continental Congress, in 1774. He retained his seat until 1785 with the exception of one year, making no speeches, but doing his share of work of committees. He was the first delegate from New York to sign the Declaration.

When the British made their first descent upon Long Island, Floyd headed a body of militia and drove them off. Later his family had to flee across the Sound and for seven years he neither saw his property nor derived any benefit from it.

In 1783 he returned to his farm, was made Major-General of the Long Island Militia, and for the next five years was a member of the New York senate. He was a member of the first congress of the United States.

The call of the land was too strong for him to resist, and in 1784 he purchased a tract of wild land on the headwaters of the Mohawk. This he cleared and took his family to live upon, leaving the region which had done him so much honor, and undertaking a pioneer's life in his old age. He died on this new farm in 1821.

**PLAN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS SCHOOL**

A school of international relations, in memory of Walter Hines Page, will be established at Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore, Md. The "Page School" will have as its purpose the development of a science of international relations, investigation and research, and training in the science of international relationships of men who will be available for service in the fields of education, government, and business. A committee, appointed in 1924, is endeavoring to raise an endowment fund of a million dollars to provide professorships, fellowships and libraries.

**ATHLETICS NEED NOT HAMPER SCHOLARSHIP**

That participation of college men in student activities need not interfere with scholarship is indicated by a comparison of averages, just completed, in Westminster college, Fulton, Mo. This shows that the average grade of all students last session was 82.69 per cent. The average of basketball letter men was 78.45 per cent, of football letter men 81.81 per cent, of baseball letter men 82.32 per cent, and of track letter men 84.34 per cent. The average of all letter men was 82.26 per cent. The average attained by the clec clubs, however, was 84.53 per cent, and the average of the debating team, 85.59 per cent.

**FAITHFUL SWANS MATE FOR LIFE**

United States Dept. of Agriculture Gives Interesting Facts About Them

The presence of one or more pairs of swans lends great charm to any suitable body of water in a public park or on a large estate. The biological survey of the United States department of agriculture, which offers this suggestion, adds that swans are slow to mate, but that they remain mated permanently, and that the only satisfactory way to buy breeding stock, therefore, is in guaranteed mated pairs.  
 Wild swans may not be captured, confined, bought, sold or shipped for propagating purposes without permit from the United States department of agriculture. The biological survey will furnish a list of dealers from whom pairs may be purchased, and information on their habits and care. Swans are large and aggressive birds and must be given plenty of space. Different pairs fight constantly, and if the available range is not large enough for pairs to separate when they choose, an ample pen should be wired off for each pair. The birds cannot keep in good condition without access to a body of water, and it is desirable that this should be large enough to maintain plant growth for natural roughage.  
 Swans graze, but not so extensively as geese. Grass, clover, and alfalfa, as well as water plants, are suitable green foods. Grain is also needed. In the northern states swans can winter in a shelter open to the south and littered with plenty of hay or straw to protect their feet. Where their swimming pool does not freeze over, no winter shelter is needed.
