

HOW TO GET MORE MILES TO GALLON

SUGGESTIONS OFFERED

Motor Club Bulletin Tells Why One Driver Gets More Mileage From Same Make Car Than Other

Have you ever wondered why it is that one motorist driving a certain make of car will get three or four more miles to each gallon of gasoline than another motorist driving the same make and model? 'Ninety-nine times out of one hundred the difference is owing to the care that the motorist getting the additional mileage gives to his car," says a bulletin issued by the mechanical first aid department of the Chicago Motor club.

"Not long ago President Coolidge's Oil Conservation board reported that there was only enough oil in sight to last six years. The United States has more than 70 per cent of the world's automobiles and trucks and in consequence it is more dependent on oil than is any other nation. The United States produces more than 70 per cent of the world's output of petroleum, yet the domestic consumption is 13 per cent in excess of what we produce. Our consumption of petroleum has increased 40 per cent in four years, but production has shown no increase. This note of warning should cause every motorist in the country to look to his use of gasoline and see to it that all wastes are eliminated."

Minor Leaks
"Let us consider first these minor leaks that result from faulty connections or a leaking gas line," continues the bulletin. "The motorist may notice that a few drops of gasoline drip on the floor of the garage but may pay no particular attention to this condition, yet he may lose from a leak of this kind somewhere from one quart to a full gallon of gasoline."

"Faulty carburetor floats and needle valves also result in a great loss of gasoline. Another waste that must be watched carefully is the extravagant use of gasoline for washing parts. Owners of garages and repair shops should caution their mechanics against the unnecessary use of gasoline in this kind of work."

"On any city street or country highway the motorist is sure to encounter cars that omit a strong odor of gasoline from the exhaust. The driver

of the car omitting such an odor is wasting gas. Proper carburation will eliminate much of such waste.

Burning Up Money
"Many drivers are not careful in using the choke. Running with the choke partly open is one of the surest ways of burning up money. In addition to the waste of gas this practice results in even greater harm; the gasoline leaks into the crank case, the oil is diluted, and burned-out bearings or scored cylinders may be the price that the motorist has to pay for this piece of carelessness."

"Improper lubrication or lack of lubrication is another cause of gasoline wastage. A slipping clutch will also cause a loss in gas. If brake bands bind the motor will require more gas to pull the load. In this class also comes under-inflated tires. Then there is the more deliberate waste of gas that results from letting the motor idle for long periods while waiting to pick up passengers and while stalled in traffic jams where the motor should be shut off. Stand at a grade crossing and watch a long slowly moving line of freight cars pass. The majority of drivers forced to wait at such a crossing will let their motors idle. Some drivers do this believing that it is more economical to leave the motor idle than it is to shut it off and start it up again in a few minutes; they believe that it is more expensive to use the starter than it is to let the motor idle."

MOST LIBRARIES FOR WORKMEN IN PRAGUE

In the number of libraries for workmen the city of Prague surpasses all other cities. The state statistical bureau announces that 490 libraries of this class are maintained in the city, with 208,127 volumes—an average of 425 volumes per library, writes Emanuel V. Lippert in School Life. The "Czechoslovak Professional Assembly" founded 93 of these libraries, with 44,686 books; the Czechoslovak Workmen's Union founded 82 with 40,124 books; and the International Professional Workmen's Union founded 70 libraries with 32,523 books. The last-named organization maintains a central library of 18,618 books. The union of compositors, lithographers, and printers has a library of 10,008 books. It was established in 1862.

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PUTS LATIN ON PAR WITH MODERN STUDY

To place the study of Latin on a parity with the study of modern languages, the University of North Carolina has reduced the amount of Latin required for admission to the College of Liberal Arts. A sliding scale has been adopted, and students will be admitted on a minimum of two units work. It is not the intention to minimize importance of the study of Latin, but to make it possible for students having less than four years of

high school Latin to continue at the university their study of the language.
