METHODIST PASTORS MOSTLY RETURNED Churches in Lake County Generally Get Same Ministers As Before

Pastors of the Methodist Episcopal church in Lake county were assigned at the closing session of the Rock River conference of the Church at Freeport, recently. While a number of changes have been made among the pastors in the county, the majority of those who served the 14 M. E. churches in the county are being retained for the coming year.

Among those who will be retained are Rev. Eleazar Dawe, pastor of the First M. E. Church of Waukegan, and Rev. E. W. Lamson of the First M. E. church of North Chicago.

An important change in the county is that in which the Rev. W. A. Kishpaugh will replace Rev. L. Brett as pastor of the M. E. church at Zion. Mr. Brett has been assigned to Scales Mound and Council Hill churches in the Rockford district.

Other pastors assigned to the churches in Lake county are: Antioch, A. M. Kfahl; Barrington, H. L. Butman; Diamond Lake, W. C. Payfer; Graylake, N. S. Dye; Highland Park, W. B. Doble; Ingleside and Fox Lake, C. W. Thompson; Lake Bluff, W. W. Whitehouse; Lake Villa, C. H. Draper; Lake Forest, R. L. McKelvey; Libertyville, John E. DeLong; Wauconda, George E. Schneider; Winthrop Harbor, Harry J. Lord; Rosecrans to be supplied by the superintendent.

RAINS DRIVE SMALL ANIMALS INTO OPEN Hunters Say Snakes, Ground-hogs Have Left Dens; Many Killed on Roads

Continued heavy downpour of rain has driven all life out of the earth, according to Lake county nimrods who have been much in the country since the opening of the hunting season, and they report that as a result of leaving their earthen homes, garter snakes by the hundreds have been killed by automobiles on the roads while woodchucks and other burrowing animals have taken to the trees.

Whether or not they will return to the ground after the wet season is over depends on their chance of living through the winter.

Small garter snakes that should be seeking shelter under the tall and matted grass or down in the ground, are strewn along the country roads where they have had their lives crushed out by automobiles. Hundreds of dead snakes can be counted along Sheridan road between Waukegan and Kenosha.

In the western part of Lake county, where the recent rain was much heavier than along the lake shore, the ground is sodden and cold and the woodchucks can be found in nearly any low pile of wood or tree that is beginning to rot. If those animals are kept out of the ground until after the frost is in the earth most of them will die off during the winter for the lack of their usual protection from the cold.

The wets have been having a referendum, but it seems doubtful if they will be able to put over a recall.—Indianapolis Star.

MAY USE BOATS TO HARVEST THE CORN

Lake county farmers assert that the farmer in the vicinity of Fort Madison, Iowa, have found it necessary to use rowboats in harvesting their corn, as a result of flooded conditions of the fields, haven't much to crow about. They say that there are hundreds of places in Lake county where the water is so deep that it cannot be harvested unless the farmers elect to wear hip boots.

Never in their recollection, according to Lake county farmers, has there been such a general flooding of land as this year. Fields which have drained perfectly for years are under water this year.

This is resulting in a heavy loss. On top of this the farmers in this vicinity had to contend with the extremely early frost. Hundreds of acres of corn were nipped by the frost before it had time to ripen and as a result is practically worthless. It is not even fit for silage.

To estimate the loss in Lake county by frost and water is almost impossible at this time as the farmers do not know just how much they will be able to salvage, but it is admitted that it will be extremely large.
