

CONSULAR INSPECTOR VISITS MANY LANDS

Takes Long Trips and Gathers Wide Variety of Information for U. S.

To keep his bustling consuls tuned up to concert pitch—and to smoke out any chance of espionage—Uncle Sam keeps a corps of consular inspectors moving over the map. Incidentally, these inspectors—drafted from the ranks of experienced consular officers—and visiting as they do the year around with bankers and business men abroad, often bring home some curiously clear and useful pictures of trade conditions abroad, according to the Nation's Business magazine. Consul General Dawson, inspector for South and Central America, has a 20,000-mile trip to make when he visits his territory which includes every country from Honduras to Tierra del Fuego.

"Of course we've lost our war-time monopoly in South America," he remarked. "But today our actual position is much stronger than ever before. The American business communities in leading South American capitals are increasing in strength, and improving in quality. The class of men being sent out by our banks, industrial and commercial concerns, shows marked improvement. This has a favorable effect not only on our trade, but on our political and social relations with South America. Our prestige has increased noticeably. While our position in South American trade, etc., impresses me as having appreciably improved as compared with that of Great Britain, the British have certain inherent sources of strength which will always insure them an important share of the market. Among these are:

(1) Investments of capital in public utilities and other enterprises under British management which naturally purchase supplies from Great Britain.

(2) The experience of British banks and British traders.

(3) The fact that British concerns find no difficulty in inducing young Englishmen to remain abroad on moderate salaries."

NEW UNIVERSITY IN PANAMA IS STARTED

Laying the corner stone of Bolivar university, Panama City, was an outstanding feature of the Pan-American congress, assembled in June by invitation of the government of Panama, to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the first All-American congress held in the New World. The purpose of Bolivar university is to perpetuate the ideals of Simon Bolivar in promoting and conserving peace and solidarity among the peoples of America. It is proposed that the university shall be constructed and maintained by the government of Panama with the co-operation of representative committees from the different American republics, and by donations from governments and individuals. Though first efforts will be confined to a school of medicine in connection with Gorgas Institute for the Study of Tropical Medicine, the plan for the university contemplates courses in medicine, law, political science, commerce, agronomy, engineering, languages, history, literature,

ELECTRIC LIGHT WAS ONCE CIRCUS TRICK

Electric railway companies in the United States are taking over bus lines so rapidly that there is little independent bus competition left in cities. Three hundred and thirty four electric railway companies now are operating approximately 6,500 buses. Five years ago only 75 buses were being operated by street railways in the United States.

Careful study of bus operation by American Electric Railway association experts show some definite facts. The outstanding ones are that it costs more per passenger to carry bus riders, the depreciation is greater on buses than on street cars, and that buses cannot be operated on street car fares.

Electric railway men agree generally, that the place for the bus is supplemental to the trolley car. They are doing fine work in de luxe service and in outlying sections of cities that are not densely populated enough to warrant building a car line.

QUOTES COOLIDGE ON CITIZENSHIP

D. A. R. Chapter Makes Reference to President's Address; Timely Just Now

The North Shore Chapter of the D. A. R. suggests that as election day draws near, it seems fitting to quote from President Coolidge's address before the thirty-fifth annual Continental Congress of the National D. A. R. The President said in part: "Citizenship in America is not a private enterprise, but a public function. If we are to keep our representative form of government and to maintain the principle that the majority shall rule, it behooves us to take some drastic action to arouse the voters of this country to a greater interest in their civic duties on election day. Despite all the effort made in 1924 to 'Get out the vote,' the percentage of those voting was barely fifty."

The perilous aspect of this situation lies in its insidiousness. With the broadening of popular powers, the direct election of practically all public officials, and the direct nomination of most of them, there is no opportunity for an expression of the public will except at the ballot box. Next Saturday is an open date with Deerfield with no game scheduled.

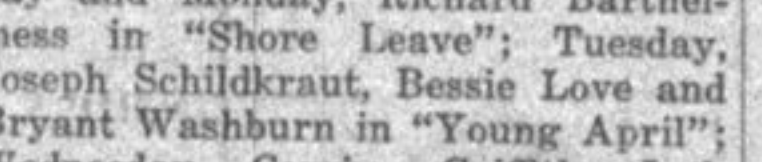
