The purpose of Bolivarian university is to perpetuate the ideals of Simon Bolival in proetaoin

ivar in promoting and conserving peace and solidarity among the peoples of America. It is proposed that the university shall be constructed and maintained by the government of Panama with the co-operation of representative committees from the different American republies, and by donations from governments and individuals. Though first efforts will be confined to a school of medicine in connection with Gorgas Institute for the Study of Tropical Medicine, the plan for the university contemplates courses in medicine, law, political science, commerce, agronomy, engineering, languages, history, literature,
