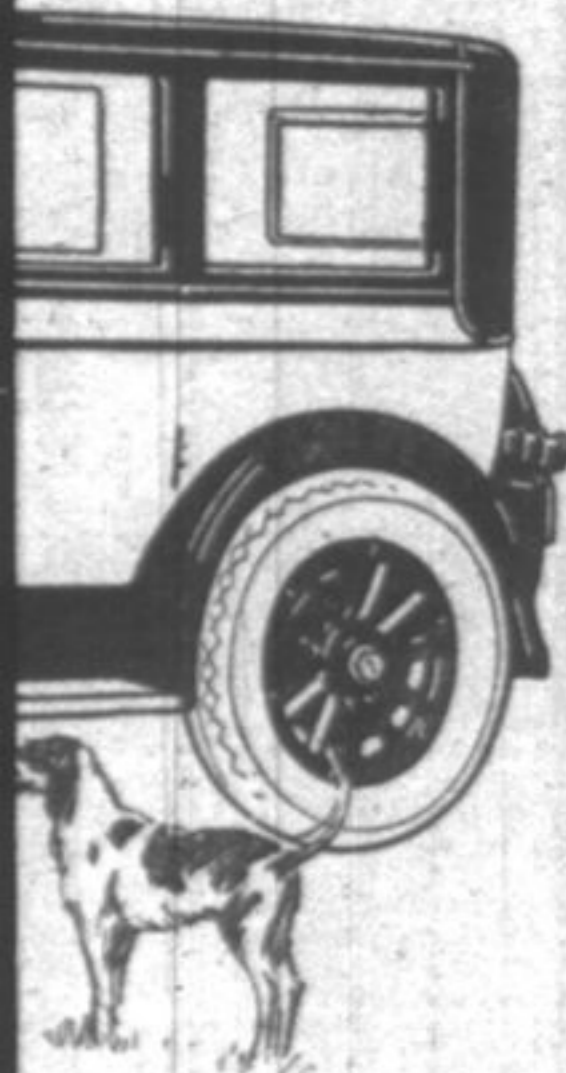

BUSINESS WOMEN PLANNING SURVEY

QUESTION OF DEPENDENTS

Also to Furnish Younger Women Accurate Data on Vacations Open to Them; Wages and Other Matters

The moot question of how large a proportion of American business women have dependents and thus qualify on an economic basis for equal pay with men for equal work bids fair to be settled for all time.

The means of settlement will be effected through the most elaborate national survey of the business women's field that has ever been conducted.

The ultimate purpose of the survey is to furnish to younger business women accurate data on the different vocations open to them and the opportunities which await them from those vocations, but the investigation is also expected to develop much information of general interest.

The survey will disclose how many occupations are now open to women; what is the minimum, the maximum and the average wage in each field; how women are trained for their work and what are the necessary qualifications for each vocation.

How Women Get Jobs Question will also be directed to how women get their jobs; whether it is through the intervention of friends, through agencies, or through a more or less hit or miss canvass.

Out of the survey should develop not only definite data along the lines which have been suggested, but also some interesting off shots. It is anticipated that the survey will reveal interesting geographical differences

in women's work, and also in the rates of compensation for similar work from different sections. It will also without question disclose which vocations are really "young women's jobs" and which can be pursued with equal success by middle-aged women.

Questionnaires for this elaborate survey will be out in October, and returns on questionnaires will be tabulated by expert statisticians of the University of Michigan staff.

The survey will be conducted by numbers, and no woman will be required to give her name, or identify herself in a fashion that would be detectable to other people.

CANNOT RECOGNIZE RUSS GOVERNMENT Bolsheviks Unwilling to Live Up to Obligations; Nothing Sacred to Them

Certainly nobody will be surprised and not very many will be displeased by President Coolidge's recent announcement that he is still opposed to official recognition of the soviet government in Russia by this country.

Not only have the bolsheviks given no assurance whatever that they are willing to live up to their international obligations, but they still raise the cry of "world revolution." They lose no opportunity to inform the rest of the world that they contemplate plunging it into bloody chaos.

Of course, as has been frequently said, the form of Russia's government is none of this country's business, so long as Russia maintains the station of a nation which respects its word and its sacred obligations. But it is

not that sort of a government. Nothing is sacred to the soviets. The world knows that Russia hasn't clean hands. Until she sees fit to lave her hands in a pan of decency, it is not the part of this or any other self-respecting government to extend her recognition.
