**Find Dying Man**

Last Monday morning Mr. Peterson of the National Brick company's plant reported to the West Deerfield supervisor, James O'Connor, that a sick man was lying on the north bank of the yards.

Mr. O'Connor took the man to the Lake County hospital in Waukegan where it was discovered that the man had pneumonia and had a temperature of 104. His name was found to be Edward J. Ryan, a world-war veteran. He gave the name of a brother in the southern part of the state, who was notified when Mr. Ryan passed away Sunday morning at half past five o'clock. The brother telegraphed to relatives in Chicago and a brother-in-law, H. C. Voits, came in the afternoon to identify the body and revealed the fact that the aged mother of the deceased whom the dead man had not seen for the two years of his life spent in wandering, lived at 5927 South Albany avenue.

Mr. Voits was most appreciative of the care given Mr. Ryan at the Lake County hospital, came to Deerfield to thank Mr. O'Connor for his share in the rescue and offered to reimburse the hospital for the expense incurred.

**J. E. Morgan Struck by Train**

Mr. J. Emerson Morgan of Osterman avenue, who was struck by a fast train at about six-thirty Wednesday evening, as he was about to take a short-cut to his home along the right of way of the C. M. and St. P. Ry., had his left arm broken and his hip injured. He was taken to the Highland Park hospital by Mr. B. H. Kress, conductor of the train from which Mr. Morgan was alighting, and which had Deerfield as its terminal.

Many Deerfield people, who live south of the station, ride back from the station on the trains that remain overnight in Deerfield and get off in the railroad yards at the place nearest their own street. Mr. Morgan had this habit and being deaf he evidently was not conscious of the rapidly approaching train when he was hit.

**Deerfield Garden Club**

The Garden club of Deerfield met Wednesday, Oct. 20, at the home of Mrs. Timson on Wilmet road.

The business meeting was brief, due to the fact that it was guest day and a very interesting speaker had been provided. An invitation from the Men's club to attend its next meeting, which will be an open meeting was read. A letter from the Library Board asking for the co-operation of the club was also read and it was voted to turn over the surplus into the hands of the civic committee to purchase books for the library. There also was an invitation from the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs to the Garden club asking it to join and from the Lake County federation asking the club to send delegates to a meeting in Waukegan Nov. 1.

The speaker of the afternoon was Mrs. Spicer of Kenilworth. She is not only an experienced gardener but as she expressed it herself, a grand mother of a number of clubs. Her talk was not only helpful and inspiring but also most entertaining due to her charming manner and sense of humor.

Mrs. Spicer first considered the planting of the garden. It is advisable to dig deep when starting a garden, she stated, as your garden really begins three feet below the surface. Plants may be set close together when the ground is well prepared. The most effective planting is to emphasize the individual plants and to have a background of shrubs. A sense of distance is to be desired with thought and attention given to scenes and vistas. The more simple the plan, the more effective the garden, she continued. The natural tendency is toward elaboration as the flowers and shrubs mature. Soil under trees should be well fertilized as the trees take a great deal of nourishment.

The well planned garden should have blooms in it from Washington's birthday until Thanksgiving. A few flowers which she mentioned particularly were snowdrops, winter aconite (which is beautiful but not used generally, the grape hyacinth and gilia capitala, which is very effective when planted in front of cosmos.

Mrs. Spicer discouraged rock gardens in this section of the country.

The remainder of the meeting was turned into a farewell to Mrs. Guy H. Newcomb who is moving to the east in the near future. She was one of the organizers of the club, its first president and an untiring worker in furthering the interest of the club. In appreciation of her efforts and of her valued friendship with each member she was presented with a beautifully fitted suit case. She will be greatly missed in this club and the club with which she affiliates in the east is to be congratulated most heartily.

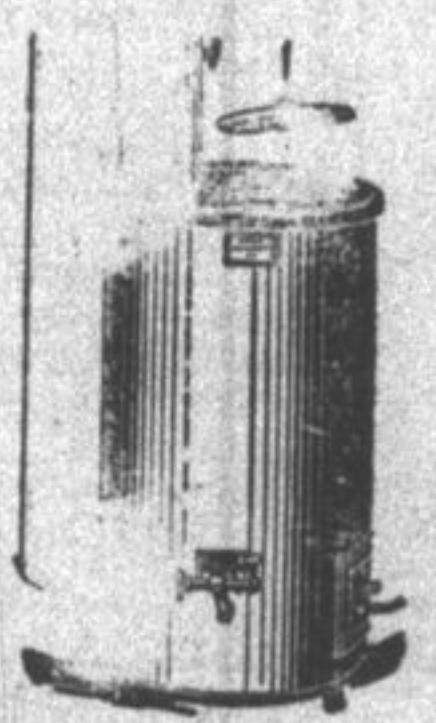

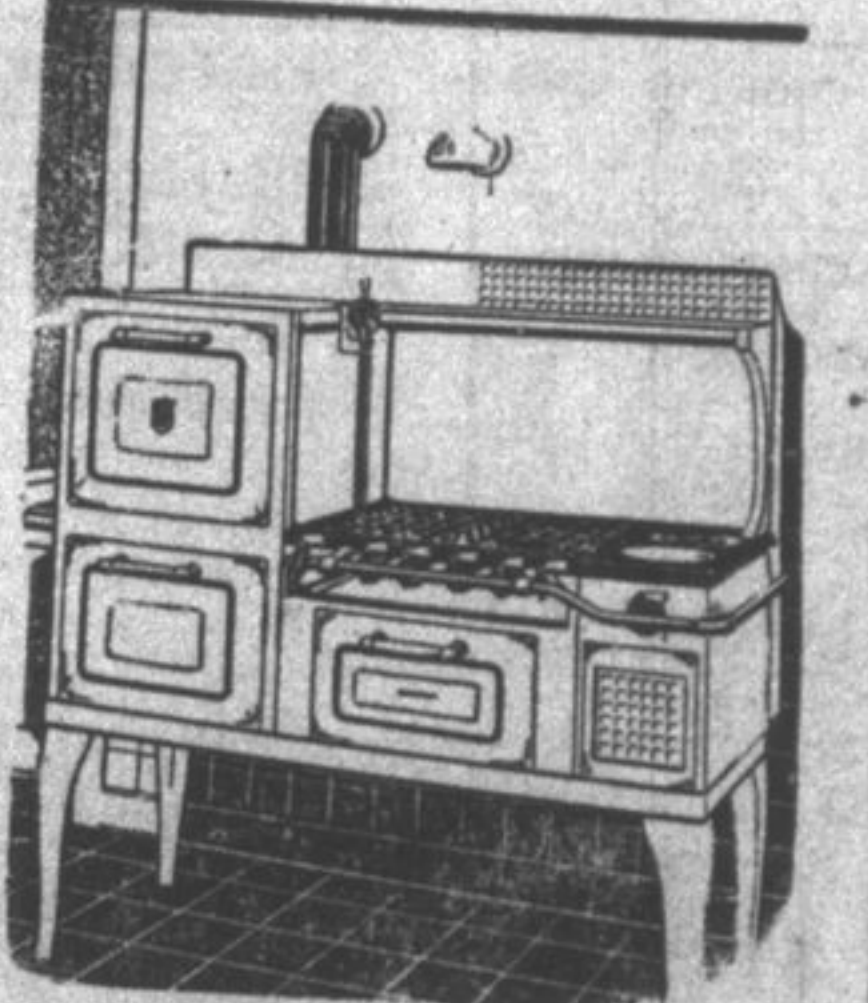

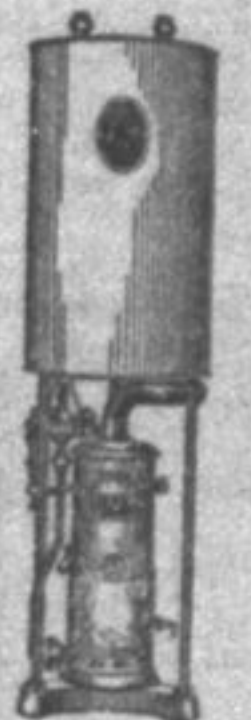
