

### CHICAGO USE OF TRAFFIC SIGNALS

AT 137 INTERSECTIONS

Regulate Traffic at 316 Street Corners in City, According to Survey; Uniformity of Control

Chicago believes in signal lights judging by the number now installed at street intersections throughout the city and the approval given them by motorists. According to the street traffic survey just completed by the Chicago Association of Commerce, the city has signals at 137 street intersections and about two-thirds of these are outside of the loop as the latter has just 49 installations. Including the number of street intersections put under signal light control by the various park boards, there are today 316 street corners in urban Chicago where traffic is regulated by red and green lights. As announced a few days ago by the street traffic committee of the Association of Commerce, the city has funds to erect signals at additional street corners in the city where the survey finds the need most urgent.

**Uniformity of Controls**  
The report of the city-wide traffic survey urges uniformity of light controls throughout the entire Chicago area. Miller McClintock, director of the Albert Russel Erskine Bureau for Traffic Research, the traffic engineer who conducted the local survey, says that many different kinds of light controls confuse the motorist, whereas uniformity of installation, according to the experiences of other cities, reduces violations and accidents as the motorist does not have to learn a different kind of signal and sign practice every time he drives through a different jurisdiction.

Chicago is going to try something new in an effort to speed up vehicular traffic on one busy outlying street, according to an announcement of the traffic committee. The idea is to move cars at a more or less uniform rate of speed without stop lights holding up the automobiles every few blocks. Broadway, between Wilson avenue and Devon ave., has been chosen for this same traffic installation which Mr. McClintock, director of the survey describes as "systematic control on a progressive timing plan." This plan, which was developed by the Association of Commerce survey, has been approved by the city and orders have been issued for it to be put into effect on Broadway. Although no official announcement has been made as

to how extensive this system may be developed in other parts of the city, it is possible that other streets will be put under this system.

**Explains System**  
Mr. McClintock explains this new system as follows:

"There are a number of streets in outlying districts along which for a considerable distance there is business activity and varying volumes of traffic. Everything possible should be done to facilitate the movement of through traffic along these arteries, as congestion means a loss to the business interests on the street. Also adequate protection must be given to cross streets. An occasional stop light will not serve. Such an installation protects cross traffic, but the protection is too great an obstacle in the way of the through traffic. Where conditions make it possible to locate a series of lights they should be coordinated on what we call systematic control on a progressive timing plan.

"And this is the way such a system will help the motorist. Once a car gets in step with the signal it will be able to move in either direction through 2.27 miles of the controlled area on Broadway at a speed approximating 20 miles an hour. In other words this is something like despatching a train over a given piece of track. Traffic along Broadway will move in waves or trains and between each will be adequate interval for cross vehicular and pedestrian movement."

### FINEST ETCHINGS CHOSEN FOR SHOW

This year's "Fifty Best Etchings in America," for exhibition in the Rotary show of the American Institute of Graphic Arts, have been selected from the collection of 2500 prints in the Palace of Fine Arts at the Sesqui-Centennial International exposition in Philadelphia. The selections were made by Burton Emmett, president of the A. I. G. A., and Ralph M. Pearson, recognized authorities in their field. They found the Sesqui-Centennial exhibit the most comprehensive in the country. They were conducted through the exhibit of etchings by Alexander Bower, director of fine arts.

The Rotary Show of the American Institute, at which duplicates of the fifty etchings selected will be exhibited, will open simultaneously in October in New York, Boston and Chicago. The 2500 prints in the Palace of Fine Arts were assembled from all parts of the country, lent to the exposition by museums and private collectors, and the collection is declared by art connoisseurs to be the best ever brought together in one place.

### FRENCH ARMENIAN IS PHILANTHROPIST

A gift of \$200,000 from Boghos Nubar Pasha, a French philanthropist of Armenian descent, is announced by the Near East Relief committee, for relief work among Armenian refugees in Syria. The gift is contingent upon subscriptions of \$300,000 from America for the same purpose.
