HIGHWOOD TEAM IN ANOTHER WIN

Defeat Roseland Boosters Last Sunday; Not Scored on in Seven Games

The Highwood football team walloped the Roseland Boosters last Sunday to the tune of 8 to 0. The game was much more one-sided than the score indicates. When Highwood's regulars were in the game they gained at will. Even when the team consisted entirely of reserves they were more than able to hold their own. They were in scoring distance several times but on account of fumbles or bad breaks failed to do so.

The game started with the Boosters kicking to Highwood who with some well executed plays were able to march to a touchdown. The locals looked like champions on this march. After the touchdown Highwood kicked to the Boosters and forced them to punt at once. Highwood made another march but lost the ball on an incomplete pass on the 15 yard line where they held and forced the Boosters to attempt a kick which was blocked and rolled over the end of the field scoring a safety for Highwood.

Owing to the fact that most of the regulars had been replaced the teams battled evenly the remainder of the half.

In the second half Highwood's team consisted entirely of reserves. There was no scoring this half but the ball went up and down the field pretty rapidly. Highwood started another march down the field and lost a chance to score on an incomplete pass.

In the last quarter the Boosters, with the aid of a few passes, were in scoring distance but could not penetrate Highwood's defense. At this time the regulars started to get back in the lineup. They substituted two and three at a time until the entire first team was in the game again. Then Highwood started to operate smoothly and another march was started, but the game ended too soon for another touchdown.

Next Sunday the Washington Heights team will visit Highwood and this should be about the hardest team Highwood has opposed thus far. Sunday this team played Washington Park to a 13 to 13 tie. This game will be the first game in the finals for the Mid-West League championship.

The annual Thanksgiving game between Highwood and Lake Forest was called off Monday night at a meeting of the two managers. Not being able to arrive at a satisfactory arrangement Highwood offered to play the game giving the entire receipts to some worthy charity. This Lake Forest refused to consider, so the game was definitely cancelled. —Contributed.
