

OFFICIAL CANVASS OF ELECTION VOTE

REPUBLICANS WIN ALL

Smith's Big Lead Over Brennan; Wets Have Big Majority; Total Vote Light; Legislative Vote

The official canvass of the election vote, conducted by County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, shows that Col. Frank L. Smith, elected senator, received 6,876 votes in the 57 precincts in Lake county.

George Brennan, democrat, got 3,858 and Hugh Magill, Tribune candidate, 2,360.

This gave Col. Smith 658 more votes than these two men together.

Others for senator were as follows: Christensen, progressive, 82; Jennings, socialist labor, 31; Lynchheim, commonwealth land, 4; Whitlock, socialist, 79; Logan, high life, 10; Engdahl, workers communist, 17; Raymond O'Keefe, light wines and beer, 67; Kirby, independent, 42, and Irving, independent, 13.

For state treasurer: Kinney, republican, 8,989; Nelson, democrat, 2,232; Bird, progressive, 57; Bloemman, socialist labor, 27; Penrod, commonwealth land, 4; Brooks, socialist, 81; Brown, high life, 5.

Public instruction: Hair, republican, 9,278; Jamieson, democrat, 1,974; Blount, progressive, 50; Alexander, socialist labor, 32; Tate, commonwealth land, 6; Hall, socialist, 81; Kotwas, high life, 8.

Clerk supreme court: Vail, republican, 8,974; Logan, democrat, 1,976; Strauch, progressive, 44; Williams, commonwealth land, 5.

The total vote cast was 14,098.

The wet vote ran 6,690 to 5,495 dry, for a plurality of 1,195. Of that number the Bentons cast 1,567 dry votes and 395 wets giving Zion and surrounding territory to the dries by 1,172.

On the tax amendment 6,357 were for and 4,332 against, and the canal lease 8,918 for and 2,249 against.
