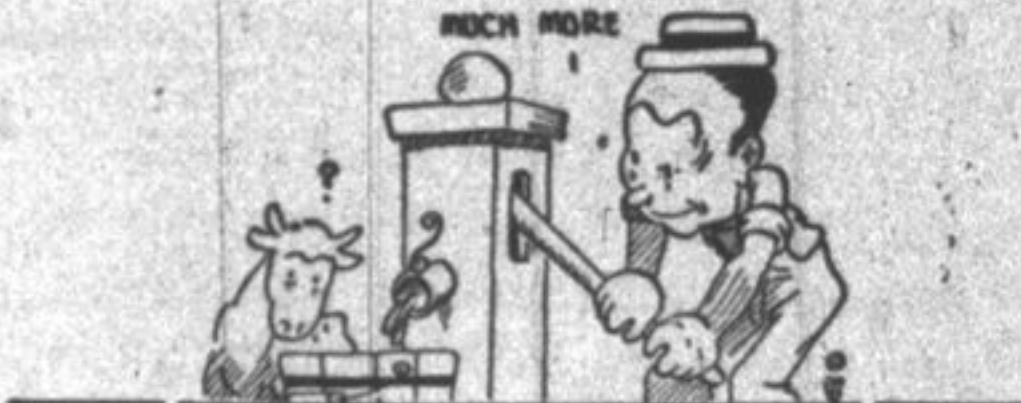

Snickers From the Fashion World

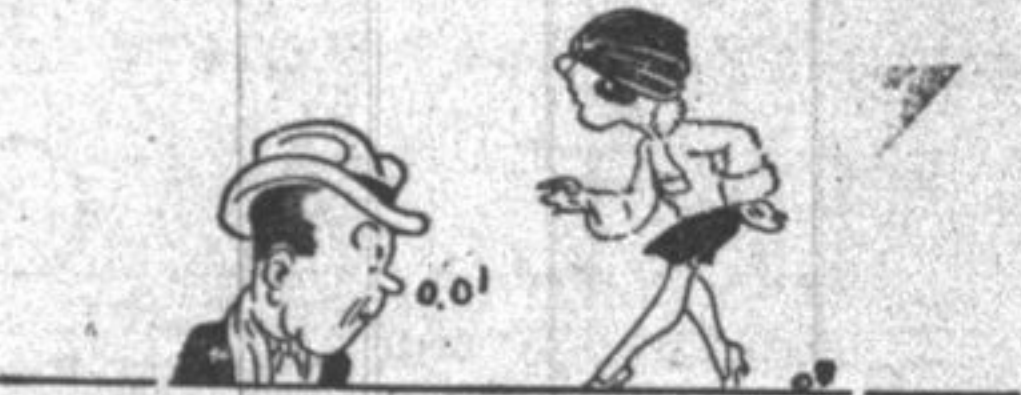
Frocks of "stoptight" red are the latest wrinkle for flappers. The girls better hang a sign on their backs then, too, reading:

PORTER HEAPS WINS ORGANIST CONTEST

Takes First Place in Interstate Affair Recently; Philadelphia

Porter W. Heaps, 2135 Ridge avenue, Evanston, organist of the First Congregational church of Wilmette, was victorious in the national interstate music students' contest, in the organ division, at Philadelphia last week. In capturing this honor, Mr. Heaps was given recognition, it is reported, as the foremost organist in the United States under the age of 24 years. Mr. Heaps, who is a pupil of Stanley Martin, in charge of the organ course at Northwestern University School of Music, recently won the preliminaries to the national contest, first in Illinois, and then in four mid-

die western states. That assured him the chance to compete in the national meet at Philadelphia.

Mr. Heaps is now a senior at Northwestern Music school and also is president of the music school's student council. He is well known and liked on the Evanston campus and was formerly campus chapel organist.

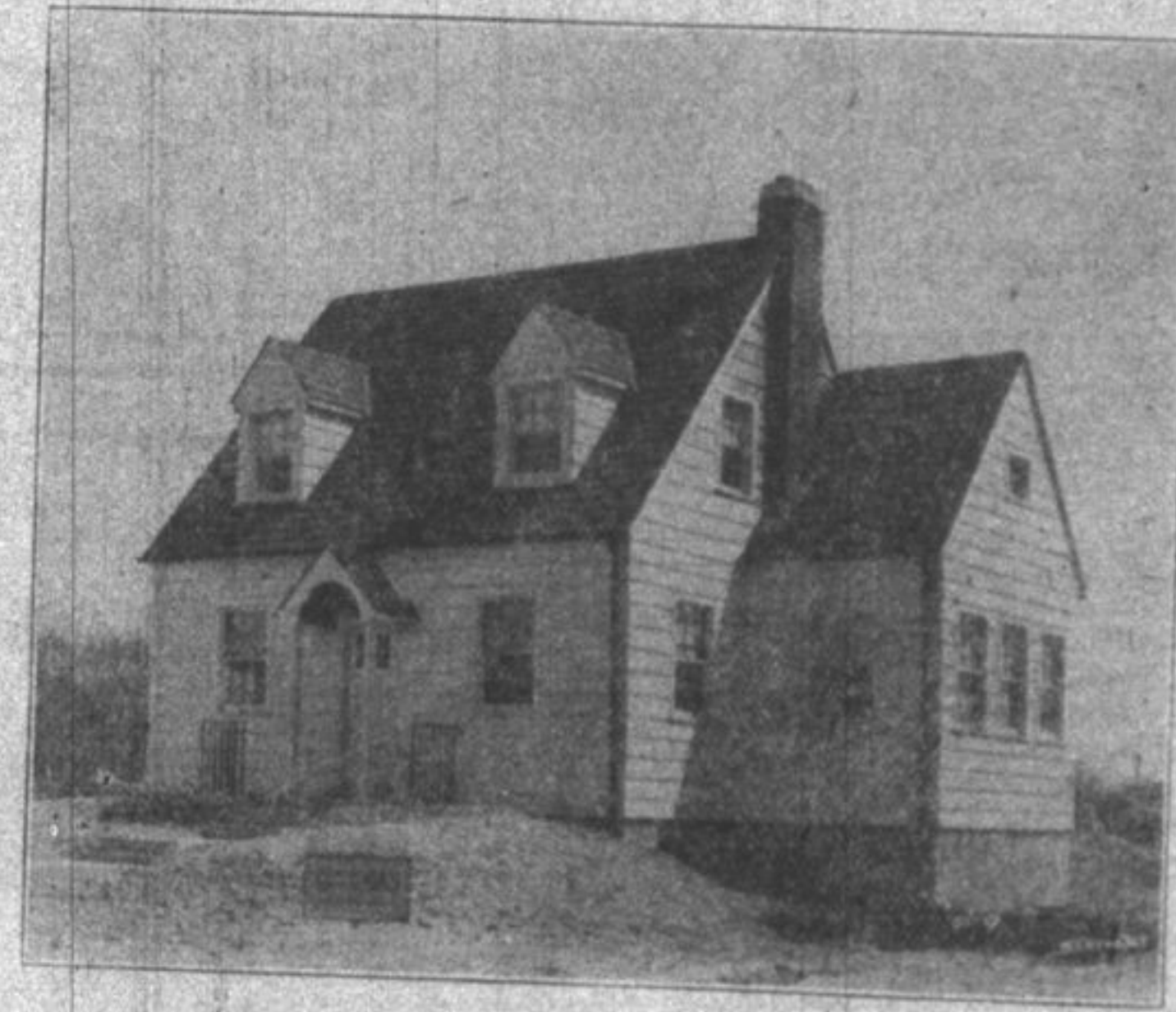
