

LOMBARD SELLS MUNICIPAL PLANT TO PUBLIC SERVICE CO.

Disposes of Local Electric Distribution System and Insure to Its People Lower Rates

Following a thorough investigation of quality of service, rates and general policies of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, the Lombard board of trustees, in session Monday evening, Nov. 1, voted unanimously to sell its municipally-owned electric distribution system to the above named company.

This action brings to the residents of Lombard a substantial reduction in lighting rates, and carries with it all of the customer-privileges which prevail in the 278 communities served by this company.

Some History
Prior to April of this year, Lombard purchased its electricity from the Chicago Suburban Power and Light company on a bulk basis. Following the purchase of this latter company by Public Service, Lombard continued to buy its electricity as a municipality and to redistribute electrical energy to individual consumers in the community.

The new scale entitled all general lighting customers to a rate of 9 cents net per kilowatt hour for initial consumption in the month, 8 cents net per kilowatt hour for secondary consumption and 6 cents net per kilowatt hour for excess consumption.

Result of Investigation
Announcement of these rate reductions influenced the Lombard board of trustees to institute an investigation, which finally resulted in the action of Monday evening.

"Every electric light user in Lombard," says Vice President John G. Learned of the Public Service company, "will have the advantage of a reduction in lighting rates following this change in service. In addition, they will be visited in the near future by a representative of this company who will replace all burned-out lamps and fill all empty sockets with 60 or 100 watt lamps without cost to customer. Other sizes will be furnished at substantially reduced prices."

Mr. Learned also announced that in the near future a Public Service store will be opened in Lombard and a complete line of household electric appliances, fixtures, etc., be displayed. He stated further that construction of a beautiful substation at Highland

avenue, Westmore, (recently annexed to Lombard) will be started immediately.
Electricity for the power requirements of Lombard's municipal pumping station, and for its street lighting system, also will be supplied by the Public Service company at its standard rates for this class of service.
