"IT HAPPENED IN PEKING"

Mrs. Louise Norton Miles has written another of her brightly colored romances in the setting of China. These novels are woven with two sets of threads, one, the background, the gold and silver, jade green, and turquoise blue of China; the other, the love story, of good old fashioned black and white cotton. It is sometimes a shock to change from one to the other, but perhaps it is well in order to satisfy all types.

They had but two very strongly, a clinging hold of each other, a bitter dislike of China, in the beginning way in which the story begins. And so we are given this reasonably certain about one is a man and the other is a girl that before the end of the story we shall see a reversal of both these attitudes.

The story is well written as are all Mrs. Miles' they give more for the exterior than the interior view of China but they give that exteriorly.

"THE NORTH WAVE"

Truly, having finished "The North Wave" by Carl Van Doren, I find myself wondering just what it was about. It is, to be sure, the inner story of a man as he moves from fifteen to fifty, but what exactly that inner story means I am at a loss to say.

His critics accused Willa Cather's "Professor" of being vague and indefinite, but he at least, we stood very close to at the crucial moments of his life. This other professor—forgot to mention that Mr. Van Doren's hero also follows that calling—I did not come close to at any point. The story was never really defined, clear cut.

If one would give to the world an inner story one must make it dazzlingly important, tremendously intimate. For it is only then that it equals our own inner experiences and makes us one with the character, which is what we are supposed to be. We know Kent Harrow best when he is a boy, but later on during the experience of growing old we lose touch with him. It seems to me that one of the most poignant experiences of growing old would be the comparison between the dreams of youth and the actuality. This comparison Kent Harrow does not make, and so we are never sure whether life has been satisfying to him or not. The book is simply written, if it could only have combined simplicity with richness it would have been much better.

A MAN'S IDEA

"MY HERESIES"

This book by Bishop William Montgomery Brown is quite an unusual thing. It is not many men who have the minority, the patience, the fortitude, to analyze dispassionately their mental developments. That is what Bishop Brown has done and that fact alone makes the book worth while.

He describes himself as the little boy bound out to a farmer to work when he was only six and a half years old. The farmer didn't believe in education so Bill Brown grew up without the faintest rudiments of one. When he determined to get one for himself he was so far behind that he had to take all the short cuts. He didn't study anything that didn't apply actually on the point. And this pugnacious individual being just what the church wanted he rose rapidly.

Then one day when he was laid up with illness he read Darwin. A whole new world opened before him. How he tried to reconcile this world with

the church in the plot of the story is a rather happy chapter in a style about journalism.

EVERY WIND HAS ITS OWN WEATHER

Government Bureau Says Boomer's Old Saying Has Much
Truth In It; Details

"Every wind has its weather," said Boomer, a good many years ago. The Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture says there is considerable truth in this old idea.

The prevailing direction of the wind in middle latitudes is from west to east, roughly.

Winds of any different direction, and especially shifting winds, imply a storm disturbance of some kind. For instance, the cyclone, or region of low atmosphere pressure, is always accompanied by a system of winds directed spirally inward, counter-clockwise about the center in the northern hemisphere, clockwise in the southern. Now, this wind system almost invariably moves outward and is nearly always accompanied by precipitation on its direct side and clearing weather to its rear.

Wind from the east may therefore mean that a storm is close at hand.

Wind from the west, past and gone.

Wind from the south is commonly the most humid and frequently brings rain.

Wind from the northeast is obviously cold, and being caused frequently by an approaching storm is almost certain to bring disagreeable rain or snow, justifying the saying:

"The wind from the northeast.

Neither good for man nor beast."

The gentle west wind "brings everyone heat," and another old proverb advises people to "be business with men when the wind is in the northwest."

The Weather Bureau supports this old saying, because when the wind is from that direction at any place in the Temperate Zone of the Northern Hemisphere the weather there is likely to be cool, dry, fine, and heating.

THE RADIO FARM COLLEGE

It is expected that over 200,000 farmers will become enrolled in the Radio Farm College which has been recently incorporated by the department of agriculture. According to James P. Nease, director of the radio activities of the department, the courses on farming are distributed throughout the country by a large number of leading broadcasting stations, and are supplemented by pamphlets and bulletins prepared by the department of agriculture.

New Chinese Broadcast

Lower Position Long Wave Length Required
