

COL. FISHER TAKES OFFICE DECEMBER 1
Jurist to Fill Vacancy to Be Permitted to Assume Post Six Days Early

Col. A. E. Fisher, newly elected judge of the seventh judicial circuit to fill the unexpired term of the late Judge E. D. Reynolds will be officially seated on Dec. 1, it was announced last week.

The time of assuming his office rested with the wishes of Colonel Fisher, as under the law an official elected to fill out the unexpired term of another can assume office as soon as he qualifies under the law. He stated today that he has delayed in assuming the bench until he had disposed of some important business matters.

Other officials elected in the last election will not be able to assume their positions until December 6.

Judge Fisher was notified after the canvass of votes cast on November 2, that his certificate of election has been signed by the secretary of state and would be sent to him when he had qualified and was prepared to assume the bench.

Assuming of the bench by Colonel Fisher on that date will complete the trio of judges who officiate in the district. His associates are: Judge C. C. Edwards of Waukegan and Judge E. D. Shurtleff of Marengo. These jurists will welcome the addition of Col. Fisher to their ranks as both have been overwhelmed with work during the period between the death of Judge Reynolds last May and the present time.

FIND LARGE STILL IN McHENRY COUNTY
Explosion Discloses Illicit Use Made of Farm Plant; Costly Equipment

McHenry county authorities are seeking a Chicago bootlegging gang whose huge illicit brewery project on a farm near McHenry was nipped in the bud Friday when an explosion wrecked their equipment and compelled them to flee. Equipment valued at \$40,000 was found on the premises formerly known as the P. J. Cleary farm, two miles south of McHenry.

The equipment included stills, stoves, vats, coils, machines and other bootleg manufacturing paraphernalia. Accidental discovery of the plant was made by members of the McHenry fire department, who were summoned to the farm by neighbors when they heard a loud explosion, followed by a second.

Robert Knox, who was the renter of the farm, told the state's attorney he had rented the house six weeks ago to a man named Scully, who said he was from Chicago and who told him he and his friends wished to make it headquarters during the hunting season.

GLENCOE CHAMBER'S STAG PARTY SUCCESS
Fine Dinner and Social Session at Northfield Inn Last Week; Details

The same co-operative, boosting spirit which enabled the members of Glencoe Chamber of Commerce to put over a few months ago what is now recorded in the annals of the village as the greatest Glencoe day in its history, accompanied the members of the Chamber to their Stag dinner Wednesday evening of last week.

The affair was arranged as a post-Glencoe day event for the members of the Chamber of Commerce and other workers who had their shoulders to the wheel in forming and executing the plans for the annual Glencoe celebration. William Guyot was chairman of the committee in charge of the affair, which was held at Northfield Inn, where a fine chicken dinner and entertainment was enjoyed by about one hundred.

President Leo Hillman presided at the session following the dinner. He briefly reviewed the work of the Glencoe Chamber of Commerce and stressed the importance of its members attending the sessions regularly and suggesting plans of civic development.

PLAN NEW BUILDING SOON IN WINNETKA
N. S. Drygoods Firm Reported to Be Planning Structure; Secures Site

Acquisition of property has been completed by R. H. Schell, of the North Shore dry goods firm of R. H. Schell and company, with stores in Winnetka, Glencoe, Hubbard Woods and Deerfield, looking to the development in the very near future of a \$250,000 business and apartment building in Winnetka.

The property to be developed is on the south side of Elm street, between Linden and Chestnut streets, with 70 feet fronting on Elm street and embracing what is known as the Nelson Brothers old laundry building and what was formerly known as the Adams Barber shop.

The property was purchased by Mr. Schell from Nelson Brothers and extends back 146 feet to Chestnut court, thence west 125 feet from the east lot line to Chestnut street on which there is a frontage of 25 feet.

For the development of this ground space of 12,595 square feet, having a frontage of 70 feet on Elm street, 25 feet on Chestnut street and 125 feet on Chestnut court, Fred V. Prather, the well known architect, is now completing plans, details of which will be announced later.
