### TO STAY ON THE SEAS

Every real American will give a mental cheer for the patriotic statements made in London the other day by Chairman T. V. O'Connor, of the United States Shipping board. Chairman O'Connor politely informed the representatives of European shipping interests that the American merchant marine is on the high seas to stay.

"Congress has declared for a permanent merchant marine, privately owned if possible, but a merchant marine any how" the chairman said. "The American people stand squarely behind that policy."

Mr. O'Connor further intimated that the United States does not expect to get all of the trans-oceanic shipping in the world but that what we want is our fair share of it. His words were terse and well spoken, and American sentiment is with him. The United States has never asked for a monopoly on any of the world's business. But the American people feel that as a great maritime nation they are entitled to some of the business of carrying the world's commerce. And they are going to see that they get it.

The time was when we had to depend on foreign shipping for our commerce but that was before the war and a great deal of water has gone over the dam since then. It will not be safe or just to permit Europe to get a monopoly of the shipping business again. The question is going to come up many times in the coming session of congress and if patriotic citizens of America do their duty the questions will be settled right.
