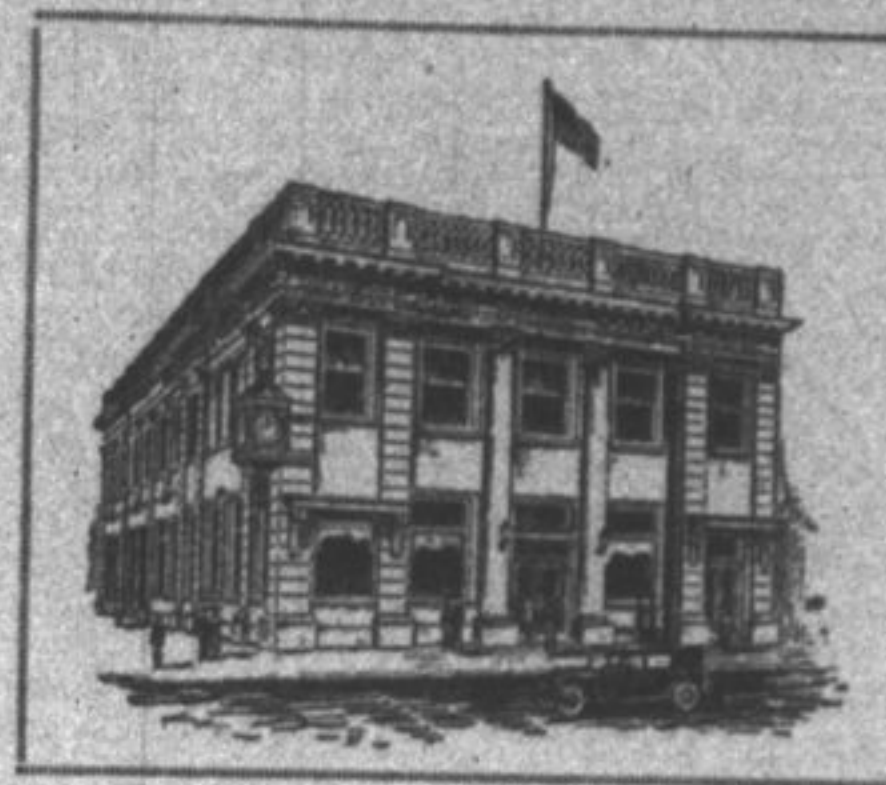

homes and are not only tax payers here, but are educating their children in our local schools.

Highland Park has two photographers and for years they have supplied the necessary photos of students from which cuts have been made for use in printed matter used by schools. They have always given adequate service. Why should students be advised to go out of Highland Park for these photographs? Perhaps somebody in authority has a photographer friend elsewhere. If so the matter should be investigated.

**May Be Investigated**  
Other such instances of unnecessary and unfair trading away from home by both individuals and organizations in which spending of public money is concerned might be cited. It may be necessary to mention them specifically later, even to start a searching investigation. It is hoped, however, that a word in time may be sufficient and that the practice, which, to look at it in the most charitable light, may be thoughtless, will be stopped.

Local merchants and businessmen who pay large taxes and maintain expensive establishments in order to serve their own community should be first considered when the tax money of the community is to be expended. If they have the merchandise or the service needed, and their prices are fair and reasonable, they should be patronized. They should have first chances when local contracts are given out by any person or organization handling public money.

**Trade at Home**  
And "Trade at Home" is equally as good a slogan for the householder and individual citizen generally. How much more pleasant it is to be able to walk into the store of a home merchant whom you know and trust and tell him what you want and how you want it. ever, at that time, there was also attached a proposition for a bond issue for a large amount to finance the erection of two new bridges on North Sheridan road, and because the details of the plan were not thoroughly understood and also because the bridge bond issue was opposed in some quarters, the majority of voters who cast ballots at that time voted against the entire bond issue plan.

**No Bridge Bonds**  
In the interval other plans have been launched regarding the replacing of the North Sheridan road bridges and this time is not included in the present bond issue proposition, so that the amounts included in the proposed bonds issues to be voted on December 13 are simply for greatly needed improvements which were provided under pressing necessity with the belief that the people of the city would realize that prompt action was necessary and would at the right time approve a bond issue to pay for the work.

The opportunity to meet this demand and take care of the indebtedness arising from these improvements will be given on December 13, and it is believed that a large favorable vote will be cast, so that the hands of the city council may not be tied and other necessary expenditures halted through necessity of appropriating funds to cover expenses which should be spread over a period of years.

**Polling Place**  
The voting places at the special election on December 13 will be the same as at the last special election. They are:

- Precinct No. 5—Old State Bank building, South St. Johns avenue.
- Precinct No. 6—Mrs. Lindholm's residence, Dean and Judson avenues.
- Precinct No. 7—Arthur Dunas' real estate office, West Park avenue.

**Harvard Prize Winner**  
Philip Barry wrote the play while he was studying drama at Harvard university. It was awarded the Harvard prize of 1922 and was produced in New York in April 1923 and in Chicago in September of the same year. With Mr. H. B. Warner and Miss Lucille Watson in the leading roles it had very successful runs in both cities.

All the scenery for the play has been built in the school shops under the supervision of Mr. Robert Schneider. The scenery which was purchased last year was rebuilt and repainted and new scenery has been constructed for the second and third acts.

Local merchants have loaned furniture for the performance and the Howard-Udell cafeteria has served dinners on three different occasions for the cast, which was rehearsing at the school.

**Pass Ordinances**  
Commissioner Gourley moved passage of an ordinance providing for construction of a concrete pavement in the alley in Block 5, Original Town of Highland Park from south line, extended, of Laurel avenue to the north edge of the existing pavement in Walnut avenue in present easement in right-of-way of Chicago & Northwestern Railroad Co., said ordinance having remained on file for inspection according to law.

Commissioner Card moved passage of an ordinance amending sub-par. (b) Sec. 976 of the Highland Park Code, with reference to frontage consent for installation of filling stations. The amending ordinance is printed in another part of this paper.

Commissioner Card moved that the city clerk be instructed to draw vouchers for payment of cash rebates due property owners under Special assessments Nos. 266, 267, 271, 277, 281, 282, 283.

Commissioner Gourley moved that plat of subdivision of Lot 1 of subdivision of Lot 12, Block 29, be returned to owner for correction.

Commissioner Card moved that corporation counsel be instructed to prepare ordinance providing for construction of concrete sidewalk on north side of Roger Williams avenue, between Dean and St. Johns avenues.

**Board Meeting**  
At the meeting of the improvement board Engineers Windes & Marsh presented estimate and report No. 2 for I. D. Lain, contractor, for improvement of streets in southeast part of the city. Special Assessment No. 300, in which the amount due was reported to be \$23,000. On motion of Member Card this sum was allowed.

Member Gourley moved that James Viti & Sons be allowed payment of \$435, being five per cent deposit for maintenance on construction of sanitary sewer and water extension in Ross subdivision, in accordance with
