ANNUAL RED CROSS CAMPAIGN GOES ON

UNTIL FINAL MEMBERSHIP

While Officially Closed Thanksgiving, Need So Great That Efforts to Increase Members Made

Thanksgiving day marked the official closing of the tenth annual roll of the Chicago chapter of the Red Cross, which began on Armistice Day. Unofficially, the drive will continue until the last membership drive is held, and the last contribution listed, according to the North Shore chairman of the local committee, James B. Forgan, in charge of the drives in this territory.

James B. Forgan, chairman of the Chicago chapter, summarized the position of the Chicago chapter at a meeting of the executive committee on Wednesday last, at which reports on the drive were received. Demands on the treasury of the local chapter have been unprecedentedly heavy during the year just closing, he pointed out, because of the relief work necessitated by numerous great disasters including the Florida hurricane, the floods in Illinois, Kansas, Iowa, and other states, and scores of similar emergencies.

Good Record
Chicago's record, which includes the North Shore, in these instances was excellent as always, Mr. Forgan emphasized, the amounts forwarded to the sufferers comparing so favorably with those sent by other communities as to be outstanding. This generosity, however, operated to the detriment of the annual roll call, he announced, many of those who gave generously to the disaster funds feeling that they had done their share and that they could not afford to donate again. A further hindrance to the efforts of the 5,000 volunteer workers to replenish the chapter treasury was seen in a renewed appeal broadcast for the sufferers in Beardstown and vicinity, which was launched in the midst of solicitation for the Red Cross memberships.

Another Disaster
Even at this writing, another great disaster has struck the states of Missouri and Arkansas, California also is suffering, and the national Red Cross has again been called into action to take charge of the disaster relief work. There is the probability, again, that the Chicago chapter will be called upon to contribute funds to this work and another drain on the reserve of the national organization disaster funds.

In view of this regrettable situation, the committees in charge of the local campaigns would appreciate hearing from any person or persons who have not as yet enrolled in the ranks of the Red Cross for 1927, who wish to contribute to the funds or to assist the Chicago chapter in any way.

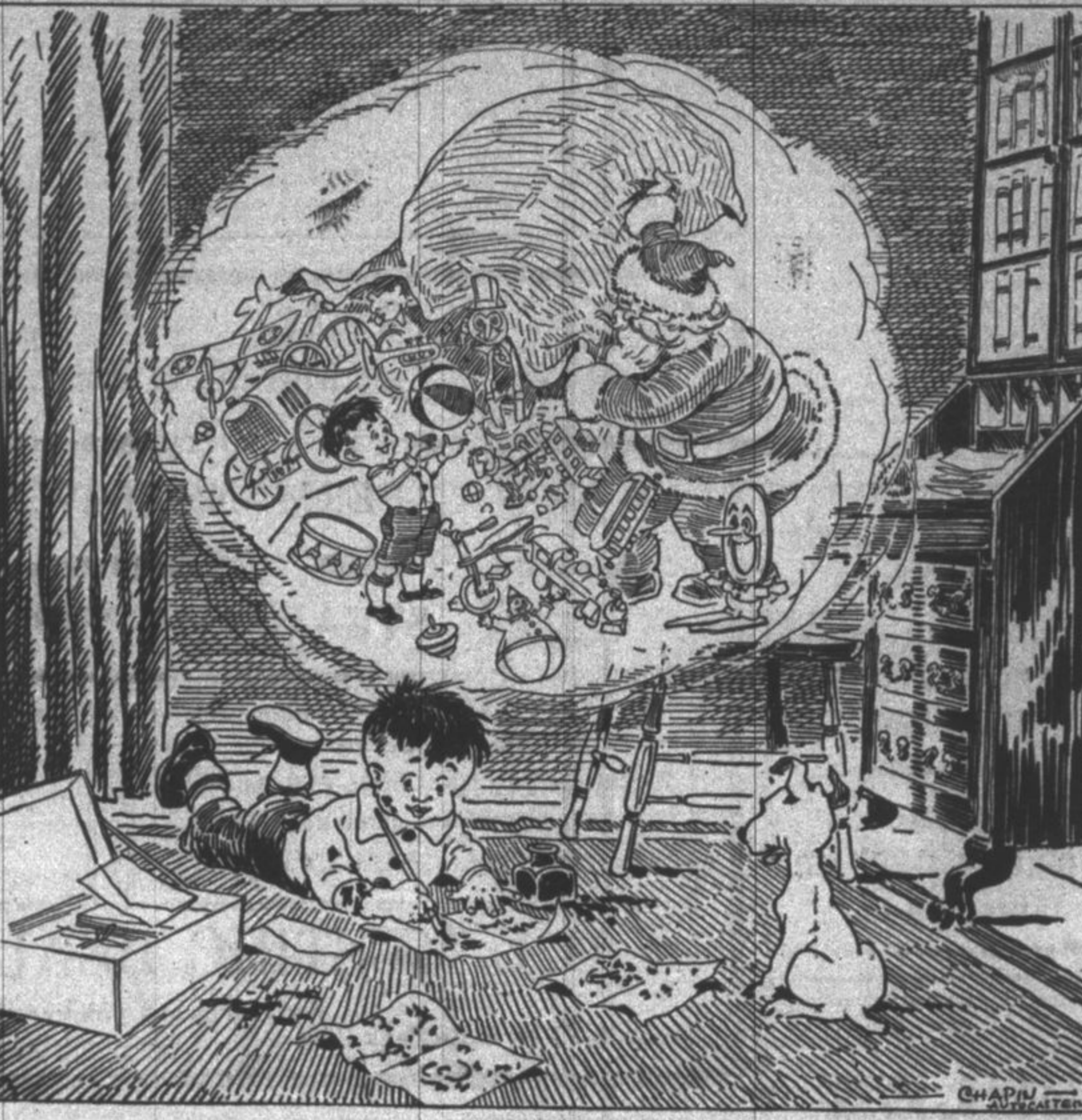
WINNETKA HEALTH OFFICER APPOINTED

Dr. Howard A. Orvis of Grass Lake, Mich., a graduate of the University of Michigan, last week was appointed health officer of Winnetka by the village council.

Because of the rapid growth of Winnetka and the consequent increase in problems involving the health of the community, such as milk and water supply, sewage disposal, inspection of food establishments and food handlers, health supervision in the public schools, in addition to the ordinary control of communicable disease, the village council has for sometime been considering the necessity of placing the position of health officer on a full time basis. After careful consideration and discussion, a resolution was adopted in June providing for the employment of a full time health officer, with adequate medical and public health training and experience, to handle the health work of the village.

WANT TO REGULATE DANCE HALLS HERE

County Board Favors Plan of Winnebago for Legislation in Matter
Several members of the Lake county board of supervisors are viewing with considerable approval the attitude of the Winnebago county board of supervisors who have made a demand that the Illinois legislature pass a drastic road house and dance hall law. At present there is no law which regulates road houses, although there is a law which provides for the licensing of dance halls.

The Winnebago county board feels, it is said, that a drastic law which incorporates both road houses and dance halls in its provisions, should be passed by the state in order to give county boards more power in the regulation of such places. The resolution urges the state legislature to take up the matter at the forthcoming session in order that it may become operative for next season. Members of the Lake county board are said to feel much the same about the matter. They believe that under the law they should be empowered to regulate the road houses as well as the dance halls and it is indicated that they may decide to pass a resolution similar to that in Winnebago county.

DRIVE TO COLLECT DELINQUENT TAXES

PLANNED IN LAKE COUNTY

Internal Revenue Collector to Make Effort to Bring In Over-due Income and Other Money

A campaign for collection of thousands of dollars due to the federal government in income tax through sales of real estate and farm lands in Lake county in which there are hundreds of former owners of the lands involved, has been started by A. N. Tiffany, deputy U. S. internal revenue collector, with offices in Waukegan. While there is no way to check up on the total sum owed to the government until each individual case has been handled it is thought that the amount owed to the federal government will run near \$100,000.

The delinquency is due to two reasons, one is the failure of property owners to list receipts from sale of lands as profits and the other is the failure of these sellers of realty to list the actual amounts received for their lands.

Many of the sellers of realty and farm lands in the county during the past year or two have been listing the value of the realty formerly owned by them on a 1913 basis, instead of giving the actual value of the property at the time of sale.

Property values in Lake county have increased more rapidly during the last two or three years than those in any other county in the state with the possible exception of Cook county.

Mr. Tiffany points out that land in Skokie valley worth \$100 an acre in 1913, sold 3 years ago for \$1200 and in 1924, the following year the same property sold for \$2,800 an acre.

In one case Mr. Tiffany states that he is seeking to collect \$4,900 from the sale of one tract of land in the Highland Park district which was not included in an income report.

With the number of these cases already large in the county and more arising with the sales of property each week, these promise to develop into one of the greatest problems confronting the local collector.
