

ELECTRICITY SAVES HUGE AMOUNT FUEL

Efficiency in Generation Improvement Which Has Resulted in Coal Economy

Improvement in the efficiency of generation of electricity by the central station industry of the United States since 1919 has saved nearly 900,000 tons of coal, according to a survey compiled by the United States Geological Survey. Translated into money, this saving has conserved about one-third of a billion dollars the wealth of the nation between 1919 and 1925, while the cost of fuel increased 15 per cent, the average output swelled 80 per cent, the survey shows. The saving of coal—of our most important natural resources—was actually more than the electricity consumed. Better generating equipment, in-connection, and more skilled operators are some of the factors accredited with the saving.
