Orphanage In Armenia Describes Recent Disaster There

The first letter describing scenes of the Armenian earthquake, as they appeared to the American relief workers whose great orphanage buildings were in the heart of the stricken area, has just been received in New York. It is from Moss Matie B. Johnson of Burlington, Iowa, who is the Near East Relief's orphanage director Leninakan, Armenia. She writes:

"I was just having coffee at the end of a late dinner when without warning there came a terrible roar. The house trembled and shook, the chandelier waved back and forth, and the the collapse of the orphanage roof ov- that date, according to the cabled recracking timbers. Within three minutes the second shock came, but I was already out of the house and shouting orders for the evacuation of twenty orphanage buildings up and down the long street in front. So I did not get the full force of the second shock, which came with a terrible noise like a train whistle. The children were already streaming out of formitories, hundreds and thousands of them, suddenly aroused from sleep and clad in the U.S. army blankets which they wrapped shawl-like around their heads and bodies.
