

### CLEAR SIGNALS AID IN DRIVING AUTO

IN AVOIDING ACCIDENTS

Many Motorists Fail In This Particular, Says Bulletin of Club; Carelessness Is Costly

Too many motorists never achieve perfection in their driving, their records are marred by accidents of various kinds and their car operation and upkeep costs are high merely because they fail in the first fundamental of good driving—the necessity of giving clear, sharp signals of their intentions.

This opinion is expressed by Charles M. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor Club, who suggests that every motorist might profit by taking an inventory of his driving practices.

None is Immune  
"It seems that none is immune to this form of carelessness or thoughtlessness," says Mr. Hayes. "There are times when business or home cares or something of that nature press heavily upon everyone, and under such circumstances, one drives more or less like an automaton assuming, subconsciously, that the other man's mind is alert and that his keenness can compensate for our preoccupation.

"Such an attitude isn't fair when one looks at it coldly. It actually is a form of 'back passing' that the average motorist would not be guilty of if he looked at it in the proper light.

Depends on Driver  
"Successful driving—that is, driving that is free from accidents of every variety, even the most minor—depends upon each driver removing the element of mystery from his every intention. Thousands of accidents are caused annually in all parts of the country because some driver fails to give a signal and another assuming that he knows the first man's purpose, guesses wrong.

"The American Automobile Association, with which this club is affiliated, is continually active through its more than 800 local organizations in the interest of safer driving. One of its objectives in this perennial campaign is to get every motorist into the habit of giving proper signals.

"It is a problem for each motorist, individually. Unless each makes it his business to improve his own driving by complying with the signal regulation, far-reaching results cannot be achieved."

### ANNUAL SALES OF CHRISTMAS SEALS

Started in Lake County Last Week and Over 6,000 are Sent Out

The annual sale of Christmas seals, for the Lake County Tuberculosis society, officially started last week with 5,500 seals being placed in the mails for residents all over the county. There are to be 500 more seals sent out bringing the total to 6,000.

Miss Theda Waterman, nurse for the society, is in charge of this work, while Justice Wilfred E. Hall is in charge of the entire campaign.

The drive will continue to January 1 with the hope that the county will break all past records in contributions.

Blocks of stamps that go through the mails are addressed to individuals all through the county and they are asked on receipt of these seals to send back the equivalent in money to the society.

The seal sale was started in 1907 with a \$3,000 sale reported for the entire country. Last year the figures had grown from \$3.00 to \$4,500,000.

In the past 25 years 1,300,000 would have lost their lives from tuberculosis if the 1900 death rate had prevailed, but the fight that these seals financed cut down this great death rate. The rate on 1925 was 90 out of 100,000 people dying from tuberculosis.

### THIRD CONCERT AT ST. LUKE'S CHURCH

Festival Program and Requests Also Considered; Date Is December 21

The third North Shore Community Organ concert at St. Luke's church Evanston, on December 21, is to be both a festival concert and a "request program." Falling as it does on the Tuesday before Christmas, it will be a gala occasion with St. Luke's vested choir of fifty singing old-time carols as part of the program.

Just what numbers will comprise the organ music depends upon how many requests are received before December 5 by Herbert Hyde of the concert committee; requests should be mailed to him at St. Luke's. From the listings already in hand, some first rate Bach is certain to be heard, and some Christmas music of a high order.

### ONTARIO TIRED OF GOVERNMENT CONTROL

Hydro-Electric System of the Province Not Satisfactory Says Report

A general condemnation of the Ontario government's hydro-electric system has followed a comparison of its costs and charges for service with those of the privately owned system of Quebec, says the Toronto Financial Post. The newspaper's comparisons are based upon figures compiled by the Canadian government's department of trade and commerce census figures for 1924.

Cost per horsepower developed of constructing the Ontario system exceeded the cost of the Quebec system 67 points, the Post says. "Results to the consumer are equally pronounced," the paper states. "Excluding taxes of the private companies in Quebec, the average revenue per kilowatt hour generated is less than 5.5 mills per kilowatt hour in Quebec, as against 13.2 mills for the government-owned and operated utilities of Ontario.

A reason for part of this wide difference is accounted for by the number of employes of the two systems. The Ontario system requires two and one-half men to produce the same amount of energy as the Quebec companies produce with one man, the Post explains.

"In every respect the private companies are most efficient and economical than the hydro power commission and associate municipalities of Toronto, despite their advantage of large concentration of high-head power at Niagara Falls, and an unlimited credit in the province.

"Power 'at cost' by hydro in Ontario is costing more than privately generated power in Quebec," the paper states.

### GENEROUS GIFTS OF ANTIQUE FURNITURE

Also Metal Work and Textiles Are Received by Chicago Art Institute

Through the generous gifts made by Mrs. Emily Crane Chadbourne, of Chicago, of antique furniture, metal work and textiles, the Art Institute has acquired for its decorative arts department many valuable articles of early English, French, Spanish and Italian furniture. There is a rare sixteenth century "trestle" table, with an extremely long, narrow top, supported by square shaped columns midway of the top, from which flanged feet spread out in support. A curious dining table is also a rare piece. It is of maple, double gate, drop-leaf extension in three parts, with circular ends and with sixteen legs. It is of American construction, dating from 1780 to 1800. Other objects of unusual interest are an early English drawer chest of inlaid ivory, early 17th century; a Spanish chest of the Gothic period; a rare Italian chest with gesso inlays; a unique gallery tip-top table; an early 18th century French draw table of the Francois I period; a fine English chest with elaborate carvings; a magnificent early American cabinet with concealed writing desk, etc. Those objects have just been placed on display in the Hutchinson wing of the new Terrace addition to the Art Institute. Other objects which have recently been added to the collection in the decorative arts department are: two unique chairs of unusual design, the gift of Mr. William Quigley; some beautiful needlework wall panels, lent by Mrs. Marshall Field, others lent by Mrs. George Porter; rare English chairs, lent by Mr. R. T. Crane.
