Birds Help

According to the Biological Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, there are a number of important agencies for keeping down the overwhelming hordes of insects. Nest boxes should be put up in places where they will be used and planted to make up for the loss of the hallow young wild growth in which they built their nests. Water troughs and bathing should be provided in the summer season and in the winter season in the form of food provided in winter of birds from their natural enemies is not the best consideration.

MOON FARMING IS MOSTLY MOONSHINE

Old Adages About Planting In Light of Lunar Orb Not Based on Fact

Moon farming, according to the weather bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture, has absolutely no support from any scientific point of view. By "moon farming," is meant sowing, breeding, or butchering, shingling or shearing, or any other farm activities supposed to be affected by the "dark" or the "light" or some other phase of the moon. For example, up to the time of the French Revolution, it was forbidden by law in France to fell trees between new moon and full moon. Many old sayings bear witness to the common belief in guiding farm practice by the state of the moon, such as: "Sow peasen and beans in the wane of the moon; Who sowed them sooner, he sowed them soon." The scientist points out that the chief things affecting the growth of crops at any stage are: Temperature of soil and air; composition of adjacent atmosphere; kind and intensity of light; presence or absence, and severity of plant disease; mechanical condition of the soil, loose or compact; fertility of the soil; and quantity of other vegetation, or weeds, present. Meteorologists can show that the moon has nothing to do with any of these conditions affecting crops. It has no influence on weather or soil. Even the light of the full moon is not nearly intense enough to have any effect on plant growth or plant diseases. The conclusion therefore is necessarily that "moon farming" is "moonshine," and the only good it ever did was thru the systematizing of farm work, fixing a time for all activities, and the force it imparted to that very necessary injunction, "do it now."

COOK PORK WELL IS WARNING OF BUREAU

"Cook pork well" is the seasonal warning of the United States Department of Agriculture. Uncooked or poorly cooked pork may result in the serious illness known as trichinosis. This disease, which is painful and frequently fatal, is caused by a small parasite that sometimes occurs in pork. Hogs that harbor the parasites of trichinosis show no symptoms, and pork containing the parasites looks exactly the same as other pork. The most practical means of preventing the disease is thorough cooking of pork products. The heat of cooking destroys the parasites. Hence well-cooked pork is safe and trichinosis cannot be acquired if the simple rule is followed of cooking pork well before it is eaten. Outbreaks of trichinosis are generally most common during the holiday season when various special raw pork products and delicacies are consumed. The trouble also is likely to occur after the customary winter hog-killing on farms, when raw products are eaten, hence the timeliness of the present warning. The main point to remember is to cook pork well.
