

The scientist points out that the chief things affecting the growth of crops at any stage are: Temperature of soil and air; composition of adjacent atmosphere; kind and intensity of light; presence or absence, and severity of plant disease; mechanical condition of the soil, loose or compact; fertility of the soil; and quan-It has no influence on weather or soil. Even the light of the full moon is not nearly intense enough to have any effect on plant growth or plant dis-

The conclusion therefore is necessarily that "moon farming" is "moonshine," and the only good it ever did was thru the systematizing of farm and the force it imparted to that very necessary injunction, "do it now."
