SPECTACULAR FIRE
ON SUNDAY MORNING

soon busy pumping along with the local engines, while the Deerfield pumper was held in reserve in case of fires elsewhere.

Spectacular Fire

It was a spectacular fire from the outset. Great waves of flames shot high in the air and from a distance it appeared as if the entire section of the business district east of St. Johns avenue and south of Central dome. But the firemen worked manfully and as what wind there was not strong and was in a favorable direction to avert spread of the flames the fire fighters were able to confine the conflagration to the three buildings among which it started. Exactly where and how the fire originated has not been determined.

The building occupied by the Hyker Toy Co., was owned by H. W. Huber, secretary of the company, of which Wm. Pearl is president and A. C. Purdy vice president. Its contents, including much expensive machinery and a large quantity of completed toys on the first floor and a heavy stock of materials on the second floor are a total loss.

Estimates of Losses

The officials of the company have been busy ever since the fire investigating losses and insurance, of which, because of the high rates required for that type of building, there was far from sufficient to anywhere nearly cover the loss, the amount of which is not yet known.

The insurance on the building owned by the Community Service is reported at \$2,000, which will about cover the actual loss on the old buildings, it is believed, but would not nearly enough to replace them. A barn owned by P. P. Hawkins and containing some stored furniture was ruined by the fire. Mr. Hawkins says his loss is about \$300 or \$400. Another barn on the south side of the alley belonging to Martin Ringdahl was damaged to the extent of about \$250. The rear of the telephone company's building was scorched and woodwork charred in window frames. The firemen kept streams of water on this and other near buildings and thus prevented more serious damage. Telephone wires were more or less put out of commission temporarily and it was necessary to renew a section of cable.

Other Damage

Other losses were suffered by A. Price of the Federal bakery, whose stock of flour and sugar, etc., in the rear of the building nearest the fire were damaged by water and smoke. Mr. Price says his loss is about \$600 or \$700 including damage to his auto

which stood in the rear of the building and on which paint and curtains were ruined. A large Hudson auto belonging to an occupant of the east buildings was destroyed and another car in the alley was badly damaged. C. P. Sullivan, who had some plumbing stock stored on the ground floor of the Community Service building, had some loss, but has been confined to his home by a severe cold for several days and has been unable to make and estimate of the damage. There was some slight damage to other adjacent buildings and occupants of the flats over the Community Service buildings lost belongings in their rooms. They were thankful to escape with their lives, it is reported.

Heavy Loss

The fire loss falls especially hard upon the Hyker Toy Co. At this time there was a large stock of toys about ready to be shipped out for Christmas trade in addition to what already had been sent out. Fortunately the basic dies and patterns used by the concern were in a vault and were recovered undamaged. H. W. Huber stated that the place was closed Saturday afternoon and all fires were out in the building. The paints were kept in a separate building. He and another man were in the building at 5 o'clock Saturday evening and at that time every thing was secure and there was no indication of any condition to originate fire.

Broken and fire-blackened remnants of toys of all sorts lying about the scene of the fire for days reminded visitors to the spot that many of these might have gladdened the hearts of children on Christmas morning.

Firemen's Good Work

The firemen worked hard and deserve great credit for the good work in preventing the spread of the fire to adjoining buildings. Thanks also are due to the Fort Sheridan, Highwood and Deerfield departments for prompt and effective assistance in a serious emergency.
