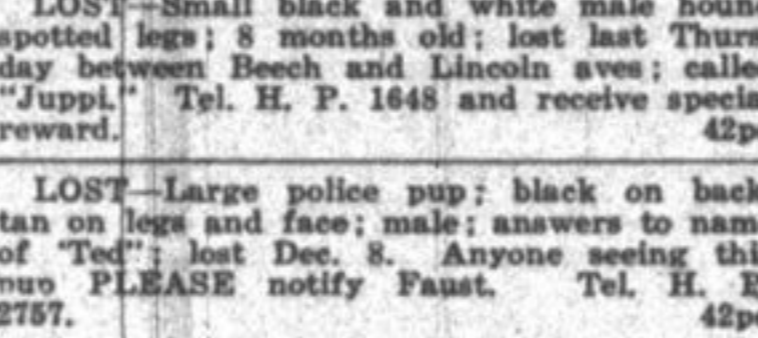

WEST POINT GIVES ATHLETICS PLACE

IMPORTANT IN PROGRAM

Every student an Athlete is the Slogan; All Sports of Beneficial Nature Are Supported

Athletics at the West Point Military academy are of two kinds, intercollegiate and intra-mural. West Point is represented by corps teams, of course, for all intercollegiate competition. Intra-mural athletics are compulsory for all cadets who are not members of corps squads.

Among interesting things connected with cadet athletic activities, may be noted the various trophies awarded for excellence in athletics. The Army Athletic association presents a saber to the cadet who has excelled in general athletics during his four years as a cadet. The Edgerton Saber is presented to the outgoing football captain. The Foster Memorial cups are awarded each year to the best all-around gymnasts. Army Athletic Association gold and silver medals are presented each year to winners of first and second places in events in the annual indoor meet.

The system of intramural athletics is so arranged that every cadet, during his four years, takes part in all forms of athletic sport. There are two periods, fall and spring. The fall sports include football, soccer, basketball, track, tennis, golf, and polo, fencing and gymnasium. In addition, for the new plebes, there is intramural work, daily, for two months immediately after they enter on July 1.

Winter Sports To complete a cadet's athletic activity, there is the winter period to be considered. The sports of this period, except hockey on the outdoor rink and polo in the riding hall, take place in the immense gymnasium. There are corps teams (providing places for 200 cadets) in basketball, boxing, wrestling, fencing, swimming, gymnastics, hockey and polo. Out of doors, during this period, are skating, snowshoeing, skiing, and coasting. Those recreational activities are open, of course, to all cadets. All cadet athletics are under the direction

and supervision either of expert civilian coaches, or of expert or experienced officer coaches.

Although West Point teams play practically every big team in the east and some from the near west, yet, in all its athletic history, in any sport there is no other contest to compare with any Army-Navy game, particularly the Army-Navy football game. Traditional rivals in everything from the age-old difference on land and sea, there is nothing in college competition even today to compare with the annual clash between the Army Mule and the Navy Goat. The "Big Three" have their wonderful battles, to be sure, but there is lacking that essential thrill that gray-clad cadets and blue-coated middies offer in this yearly spectacle. To date, in this series, the Army has won 14 and the Navy 12. Two games resulted in ties. This record shows how hard-fought these games are.

Adjusted Taxes Worry Government Find \$150,000,000 Which is Not Legally Due, Must Be Returned

The Bureau of Internal Revenue now has on hand more than 100,000 unadjusted personal income and corporation tax returns which date back four years or more. During the fiscal year 1925 more than \$150,000,000 which had been collected from taxpayers of the country had to be refunded because it was not legally due.

During the same year the Government paid out some \$31,000,000 interest on taxes which had been collected and later refunded. The entire administrative expense of collecting internal revenue taxes in 1925 were approximately \$37,000,000.

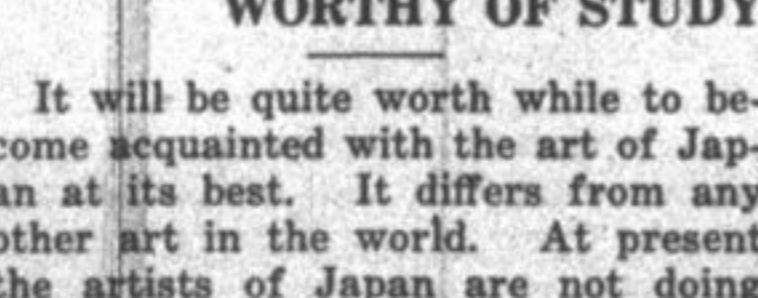
