

### N. S. TEACHERS PLAN TO ATTEND MEETING

OF STATE ASSOCIATION

**Important Convention to Be Held at Springfield Dec. 28 to 30; Fully 33,000 Expected to Attend**

Many North Shore teachers are to attend the Illinois State Teachers' association convention which will be held at Springfield Tuesday to Thursday, December 28-30. This meeting promises to be of more than usual interest to teachers and of importance to the cause of education in Illinois, according to local teachers interested.

The president this year is Mrs. Bertha S. Armbruster, principal of the Tilton school, Chicago, who is the second woman to receive this honor. The other was Mrs. Ella Flagg Young of Chicago, who was president in 1910. The program has been arranged by Dr. Walter P. Morgan, president of the Western State Teachers' college at Macomb, and chairman of the executive committee of the association.

The leading speakers engaged are Dr. Edward T. Devine, noted economist and sociologist; Cora Wilson Stewart, famous for her Kentucky "moonlight schools"; Count Ilya Tolstoy, son of the famous Russian author; Mrs. Blanch A. Buhlig, Chicago, president of the Illinois Council of Parent-Teacher association; and State Superintendent, Francis G. Blair.

Delegates for 33,000

The meeting is open to all members of the association, but the business will be transacted by delegates representing the 33,000 members in the several local divisions. These delegates constitute the "Representative Assembly," which will hear and act upon the reports of the officers and committee. The officers to report are President Bertha S. Armbruster, Secretary Robert C. Moore, Research Director L. R. Grimm, and Treasurer Charles McIntosh. Among the committees to report are those on appropriations, legislation, resolutions, teacher training, radio instruction,

### GIRL SCOUTS GIVING TWO YULETIDE PLAYS

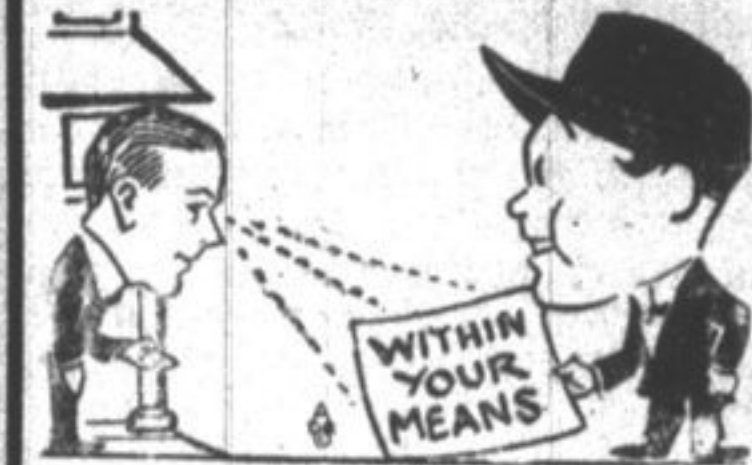
**Glencoe Troop of This Organization Will Stage Couple of Productions**

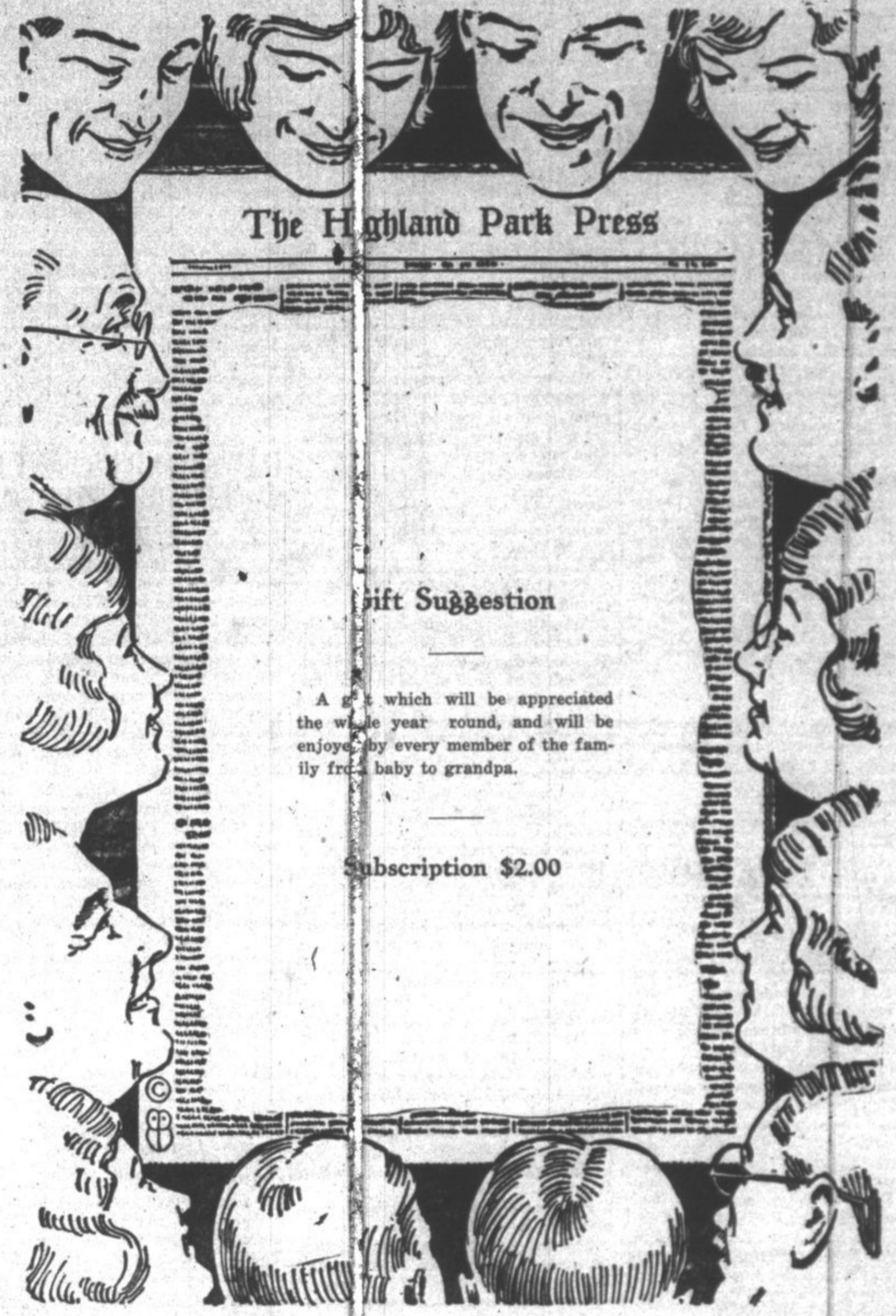

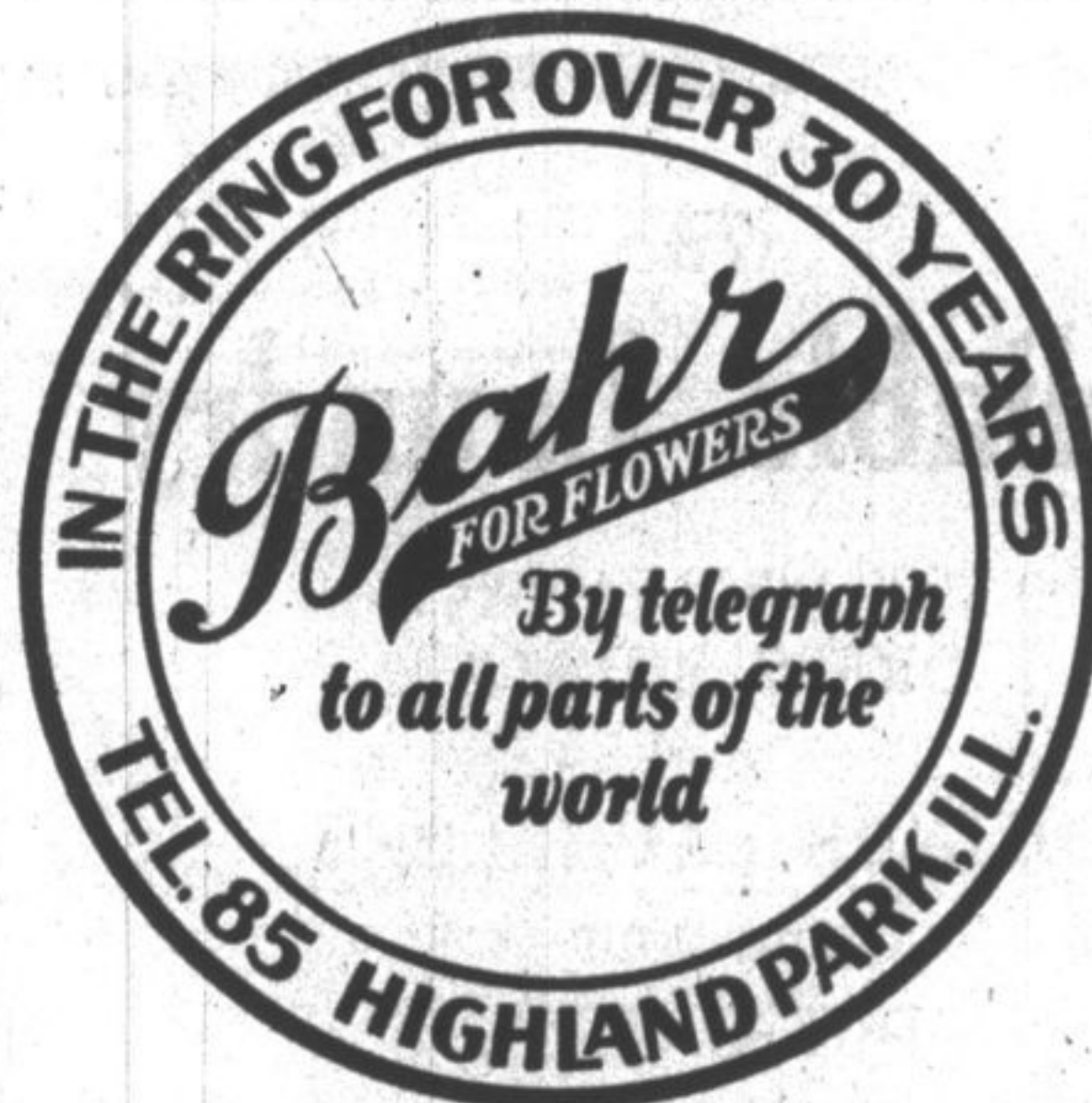
