The above clipping from the Chicago Tribune's "The Wake of the News" voices Rev. Mr. Quayle's fear that a race track will be established in Libertyville, and he has requested the good people of Lake county to try to prevent the completion of a circle of race tracks around Chicago, from Aurora on the south to some designated place on the north.

On Thursday the Highland Park women, and on Wednesday Deerfield women were hostesses at the exhibit of local artists' work in the Highland Park Woman's club, when the building was transformed into a radiant room by the glowing colors on canvas. To the right of the stage Rudolph Ingler's "Sundown in the Holler," a vivid autumn picture in the Ozark mountains, attracted instant attention. A lovely portrait of his wife, by Claude Buck, which he had named "Estrid," was on the left. "Christmas Eve," in which the artist's wife also posed with her twins, before Santa Claus, that showed the clock on the Boston store, and the elevated railroad on Wabash avenue was the object of much scrutiny. A man critic paused before Frank Peyraud's "Sunset in the Alps" and pronounced it "the best thing that Peyraud has ever done." Many preferred his "Morning Dew" as an exemplification of the Twenty-third Psalm in "Beside the Still Waters," and "Green Pastures." "Midsummer Night," was another of Mr. Peyraud's charming pictures.

The above named critic also paused in admiration before three of Mr. E. K. Williams' (of Deerfield) water colors, and said that "Mr. Williams paints with much feeling." These studies were of Brown county scenes, where Mr. Williams has bought a home, and where he and Mrs. Williams moved last week to Nashville, Ind.
Adolph Schultz, another of the Brpwn county group, had a lovely spring picture labeled "Indian Landscape."
Mrs. Elizabeth Peyraud had a portrait of a child, and a still life of zinnias that were much admired. Another Highland Park woman exhibitor was Buell Mullen, who had a portrait of an Italian girl.
Carl Kraft and Frank Dudley each had a winter scene, and Maynard Dixon was represented with "Top of the Ridge."

Mrs. Ross Beatty, chairman of the art committee of the Highland Park Woman's club, desires to have an exhibit by the local artists each year, with the purpose of establishing a market for their artistic creations.
