Deputy Sheriff Herbert Doolittle suffered several burns on Christmas day while in the act of carrying a flaming Christmas tree from his old home at Wilson, where he was spending the day. Fortunately the tree was removed before much damage was done to the interior of the house.

Dies at 94

Frank Kendall, one of the oldest residents in Lake county, died on Christmas morning at Fox Lake following a year's illness which followed injuries received in a fall on an icy sidewalk. He came to Waukegan in 1855 and lived there until several months ago, when he was removed to the home of a nurse at Fox Lake, where he was being cared for at the time of his death.

Robert Purcell, for many years an engineer on the Northwestern railroad and retired about 15 years ago, died on Monday morning at his home in Barrington, where he had lived since his retirement from the railroad. He was the second oldest pensioned employee of the railroad, which he had served for 47 years before being retired. Marvin Spoor of Waukegan, also a former engineer, is said to be the oldest pensioned employee of the road.

Four Persons Overcome

The deadly monoxide gas came close to wiping out four lives in a Waukegan home over the Christmas week-end. Two men, a man and a small boy were the sufferers. Gas escaping from water heaters was said to be the cause in each instance. Mrs. Alice Stober and Carl Brandt were unconscious when found. Mr. and Mrs. L. Schroeder, married eight days previously, were still conscious. All were removed to the hospital. The condition of the first two mentioned was for a time precarious. All finally recovered.

George McMillan of Winthrop Harbor, is in a Waukegan hospital, suffering from a serious wound in the side, penetrating into his lung, sustained in a melee at "Windy Harbor" Christmas Day when McMillan was endeavoring to part two other men engaged in a fight, it is said. One of the latter was arrested. He gave the name of Jack Allen and was placed in jail.

Appeal Filed

Appeal has been filed in the circuit court by H. E. Crum, Jr., of Highland Park, whose claim for \$1,000 against the estate of the late C. L. Hendricks was disallowed in court Monday. Crum, according to county seat reports, claimed he had contracted with Hendricks for sale of stock before the latter's death.

tor and others who gathered about the man for a moment feared it was blood. Examination proved it to be from a bottle of wine which was in the man's pocket and which was smashed by the fall.

How White Was Hurt

While they were looking after this matter, Policeman White, who had been notified that an accident had occurred on North Green Bay road, hurried on his motorcycle to the scene. As he approached the place he began to slow up, and just then a car turned out and passed the machine of Dr. Risjord, which was parked along side the road. A second machine followed just as White arrived. This latter machine was driven by C. C. Thorpe of Lake Forest. Seeing White, Thorpe tried to avoid him and would have succeeded in doing so, but because of the slippery nature of the pavement, his car skidded and the rear fender struck White, hurling him and his machine against an embankment on the opposite side of the road. White's leg was caught by the blow and he was rendered unconscious.

Taken to Hospital

With Thorpe in the machine were W. S. Samuels of Rogers Park and Daniel Wentworth of Chicago, who had been visiting at Thorpe's academy in Lake Forest, of which C. C. Thorpe's uncle is head. They and others about the scene of the accident lifted the officer into Thorpe's machine and hurried him to the hospital. He began to recover consciousness just as that institution was reached. He suffered excruciating pain for several hours and then the left leg, which was the one injured, lost all feeling and power of motion. He could not even move his toes, and it was feared that paralysis might ensue. However, with careful treatment the feeling has begun to return and he can now move the leg a little. It is believed that in a few days he will be able to leave the hospital.

Spoils His Christmas

White, who was married only a few months ago, was planning on a very happy Christmas at his home on Bloom street, and the accident sadly arranged his plans, but he and Mrs. White are thankful that it was no worse, as his escape was a narrow one.

The bicyclist, who primarily was the cause of the whole affair, was for a moment forgotten when the motorcycle and auto crashed, and when that excitement had passed, he had gathered up his wheel and disappeared, and nobody connected with the accident had obtained his name.
