Scarr, chairman of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in the afternoon. Comment from the floor was allowed following the presentation of the papers.

"The history of transportation in the United States has been replete with instances of the struggle of rival competing and connecting services in seeking to find their proper places in the transportation system," Professor Wilson said in amplifying his plea for the development of a national transportation policy. "The march of progress has resulted in the emergence of new facilities which strive to enlarge the scope of their usefulness and find a place in the sun in the transportation world.

"The co-ordination of motor with steam and electric railroad transportation, therefore, implies the placing of the motorbus and truck into the same order or rank as the other agencies of transportation and the regulation and combination of all instrumentalities of transportation into a harmonious working relationship or system each serving its peculiar purpose.

National System the Goal "The ultimate end to be attained is a comprehensive national transportation system, privately owned and managed and publicly regulated in the interests of the general public. In the system of transportation brought about through the co-ordination of the instrumentalities of transportation, each facility will find its proper place, which will be determined by the relative efficiency with which each agency performs its

A tremendous variety of products ranging from shoe pegs and sassafras oil to saw logs, railroad ties, and naval stores, is made from timber supplied by the national forests of the World war. east and south, says the Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture. The American policy of limiting and carefully scrutinizing its immigrants from Europe has been carried out in a comprehensive plan adopted by the imperial conference for the distribution of the Empire's population, mainly in Canada, Australia and L Stanger New Zealand.

By this plan, the Dominions won somewhat of a victory over the Mother Country by maintaining their right to take the immigrants they want instead of those which England would wish to send overseas. Canada, for instance, is preparing

The home government would prefer that Canada accept industrial workers as well under this scheme, but the Dominion is holding out against this.


