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United States received from time to time by radio while the expeditions were still in the midst of the polar seas in winter camp.

Widespread Interest
All this has served to arouse widespread interest throughout the country in the expedition, the men who made them successful and the many interesting things which brought back with them from the frozen north.

Especially interesting are the motion pictures taken during the course of the expedition's stay in the arctic and the natural color photographs of life and its surroundings in that ice-bound wilderness are unique and wonderful.

Explorer MacMillan's vivid description of his experiences in the polar region will be illustrated by thousands of feet of motion pictures taken by the expedition, showing scenes and conditions exactly as they are in the far north. The pictures are said to be exceptionally fine, and their inestimable value from an educative viewpoint makes this feature of the lecture especially worth while.

Exceptional Opportunity
Altogether the visit of Explorer MacMillan here and his lecture at the high school on the evening of Jan. 21 promise exceptional opportunity for those who appreciate accurate and first-hand information of conditions in the remote parts of the earth access to which is difficult and information regarding which would not be available except for the hardships and dangers of such men as MacMillan and his associates who search the unknown in order to add to the sum of human knowledge for the benefit of the race.

All who possibly can do so are urged to attend the lecture on Friday evening, Jan. 21, at the high school.

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debts, shyster lawyers, the circumlocution office, cruel school masters, etc., and his satire was so keen that once it pictured an evil it brought about reform. He knew what the common people wanted because he was one himself and he was able to describe better than anyone else the whimsicalities, oddities and absurdities and the essential goodness of the people he knew. Every house Dickens has described is ever after a haunted house, witness to their face, the number of visitors every year to "The Old Curiosity Shop," Fleet Street, etc.

His works have been translated into Chinese and Swedish, showing the universality of his appeal. His eye was clairvoyant, seeing with human sympathy the inner secrets of men's lives and the essential things that make the individual, he saw and understood the soul of his people. Mr. Bridges said that some criticized Dickens characters as unreal and fantastic but if one would sit with him in one of the stone recesses of London Bridge and morning between 7 and 9 he would guarantee to show them the same, identical people in real life today in 1927.

Mr. Bridges described Mr. Dickens as insular, that is, his thoughts were always at home in England no matter where he might be. He wrote his Christmas carol under the blue Italian skies, in brilliant sunshine, and opens his book with brilliant sunshine, and marvelous description of a London fog, or London particular, as the Cockneys call it. He said the time to read Dickens was at Christmas time and between Christmases. The next lecture given by Mr. Bridges will be on Wednesday, Jan. 19, at 10:30 a. m. at the Woman's club building and the subject will be "The Art of Renewing One's Youth."

These certificates, it is stated, have a value of about \$70 per \$1,000 insurance, depending on the age of the insured. Banks are willing to help men in need of loans, but they will discourage borrowing unless there is need. Interest rates will be two per cent over the regular rate of 90-day commercial paper. It is pointed out by the post announcement that using the compensation certificate is like making a loan on any other security where character counts in the transaction as well as the security.

The adjusted service certificate fund has been increased to a total of \$400,000,000, it is stated, which sum is pledged to the certificates. There is an estimated loan value of about \$200,000,000 according to this statement.
