### PLAN NEW CLASSES FOR NEXT SEMESTER

Opportunities for Students to Enter Expected to Be Especially Good

There will be many opportunities for students to enter new classes in Deerfield-Shields high school next semester, according to the tentative list prepared by the school office. There will be seventeen new classes in which students will be allowed to enter.

Three entirely new classes are planned, home nursing, taught by Mrs. Robertson; salesmanship, taught by Mr. Crosby; and commercial geography, taught by Mr. Zipoy. Salesmanship takes the place of business English, a one semester course, and commercial geography will be taught instead of commercial law.

Following is a list of the new classes to be organized of subjects already being taught: beginners' Household arts, shop, mechanical drawing, Latin, physiology, algebra, trigonometry, solid geometry, plane geometry, art, type, English (any English except IV A), musical appreciation, and journalism.

### SEEK LOCAL MAN IN FINANCIAL CRASH

G. M. Meeker, President of Commonwealth Reserve Blamed for Failure

G. M. Meeker, of Highland Park, ousted president of the Commonwealth Reserve fund which collapsed in Chicago last week, was blamed for the trouble in which the concern found itself, according to C. C. Woodmansee, vice-president, also a Highland Park resident, who discussed the case with Chicago newspaper representatives last week.

Meeker is said to have been particularly attentive to a slim and beautiful Chicago blonde girl, and it was rumored that she also had disappeared. Meeker's wife and children live in Highland Park.

A warrant was issued for Meeker's arrest in connection with the crash of the concern of which he was formerly head, Chicago papers said.

### SEVERAL AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS REPORTED

One Milwaukee Man Injured In Crash Against Tree; Other Minor Cases

Two Milwaukee residents, William Herron and Arthur McCann, had a strenuous experience here last Thursday when driving north on South Sheridan road. They failed to make the turn at Cedar street and crashed into a tree. The car was badly wrecked and Herron was injured quite seriously. He was given attention at the hospital. McCann was not hurt seriously.

Sunday at Central and Green Bay road automobiles driven respectively by Dr. Patten of Glencoe and Gus Leffert of Highland Park were in a collision. Leffert reported to the police that the physician's car turned aside and passed a car ahead of it, crashing into Leffert's car on the opposite side of the road. Nobody was hurt.

Tuesday afternoon at St. Johns place and Maple street a car driven by Mrs. Pheris of Fort Sheridan was struck by an express truck, according to the woman's report to the police. The woman stated that the truck driver turned to the left as he attempted to pass. The police report that no left turn is permitted at this corner.

### SPINE FRACTURED BY FALLING POLE

Public Service Co. Lineman Seriously Injured Monday; In Hospital

George Emmett, 23, unmarried and a resident of Highwood, was badly hurt Monday while helping raise a Public Service company's pole on Ridge road. Emmett and other linemen of the company were erecting the pole with pike poles when in some manner it slipped and fell, striking Emmett across the back. He was rushed to the Highland Park hospital, where he was attended by Dr. H. B. Roberts. It was found that his spine was fractured in two places, one vertebra being badly crushed and another cracked. Yesterday the man was reported in exceptionally good condition considering the character of his injuries and suffering no pain. What the outcome will be cannot be accurately conjectured.

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### TOTAL NUMBER FIRES DURING 1926; LOSSES

Alarms Answered 122 and Total Estimated Damage, \$65,915; Other Details

The total number of fire alarms answered by the Highland Park fire department during 1926 was 122, according to records kept by Fire Chief Hoskin. The total loss on buildings and contents was estimated at \$65,915, or an average loss per fire of \$540.29 and a per capita loss of \$4.34. The value of the buildings involved in fires was \$805,100 and of contents, \$84,000. The insurance loss for the year was \$10,100 on buildings and \$40,250 on contents, according to the chief's figures. The bad fire in the Hyker toy factory late in December was the most serious one of the year. No serious fires were reported during the last week. The firemen had three runs up to Wednesday, since Jan. 7, all grass and brush fires, and no material damage was reported.

### HIGHWOOD WOMAN IN NARROW ESCAPE

Brushed Aside by Train While Attempting to Cross N. S. Tracks

A woman whose name was not learned, had a narrow escape from death Tuesday night at a North Shore Line crossing in Highwood. She was waiting to cross the tracks, carrying several packages of eggs, groceries and other things under her arms. The gates were down and she decided to start across, according to reports from Highwood. Just as she got inside the gates a five-car train whizzed by, brushing her into a depression beside the gate, where she lay prone, thus avoiding being hit by other cars as they passed. After the train was gone she arose, salvaged what was left of her bundles and walked away, apparently uninjured. She'll probably wait for the gates the next time, observers opine.
