A stream of icy cold water propelled with great speed through a fire hose, proved to be a first class alarm clock for Henry Kreitzer, Libertyville resident, when he was peacefully sleeping last Friday night and his cottage was burning around him.

Neighbors noticed the fire at about midnight and called out the fire department. Kreitzer and two male boarders in his bachelor establishment described by Libertyvillians as "shack," were sleeping when the department arrived. A stream of water from the fire hose shattered the window pane and played with some force over the sleeping form of Kreitzer. Needless to say he awakened in great haste, some amazement and a considerable degree of anger.

He stormed out of the burning shack in his sleeping garments and upbraided the firemen roundly for wetting down everything and wrecking his home. Accidently the hose was turned on him a second time, and, drenched with cold water, Kreitzer and his two boarders who live in this man kept home, took refuge in a nearby house.

One of the shacks of the establish ment was burned to the ground after the furnishings had been rescued while a second shack was also attacked by the flames.
