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

COST OF BUILDING HIGHWAYS REDUCED

Savings In Operations and Increased Efficiency Is Shown In Report

Among the investigations of the bureau of public roads of the United States department of agriculture of large practical value have been those directed toward greater efficiency of various road-construction operations. Savings of from 25 to 35 per cent in earth moving costs have been shown by the bureau to be generally possible and by changes in design of grades on some jobs as much as 20 per cent can be saved in the cost of grading. The daily output on most projects

in concrete paving operations it has been found can be increased 25 percent and on some projects 50 or even 100 per cent. by adopting the improved methods suggested by the bureau some contractors have been able to reduce their bids surprisingly.

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
