#### STATE BANKS SHOW INCREASED STRENGTH

State banking conditions in Illinois were 46 per cent stronger in 1926 than in 1921 when the private banks came under the jurisdiction of the state according to a monthly bulletin issued by Oscar Nelson, auditor of Public Accounts.

This upward trend in banking conditions according to the bulletin is the result of a persistent campaign waged through Illinois by the department to strengthen the banking houses of the state.

From 1921 to 1926, the pamphlet states, total undivided profits have increased more than 105 per cent, surpluses show a 59 per cent increase and capital stock has been increased 28-1-4 per cent.

An additional \$36,000,000 has been added to the capital of the state institutions by the stock holders to protect their depositors to a greater degree.
