#### STILL SOME LIFE IN PALATINE RAILROAD

#### Hearing Before Commerce Commission Indicates It May Be Revived

That the old Wauconda-Palatine Railroad company may be down and out but not entirely abandoned and that its resurrection into actual life and operation is a possibility of the future was strongly indicated at the recent hearing before the Illinois Commerce Commission in Chicago at which time representatives of the railroad, including the receiver, appeared as complainants against the Illinois highway department charging that the department had torn up its tracks just south of Lake Zurich in order to prepare for the extension of a concrete highway across the railroad right of way.  
The argument was over the matter of grade on which the highway should cross the railroad tracks. The case had previously been taken into the courts and the circuit court indicated that the railroad had been damaged to some extent by the projection planned by the highway department. The indicated damages were \$2,000.

#### DETAILS PLANS FOR STATE ROADS HERE

#### County Highway Superintendent Tells What Paving Will Be Done in County

R. M. Lobdell, county superintendent of highways gave an address before the members of the Lake County Good Roads Officials association at Waukegan last week in which he detailed the plans of the state highway commission in the paving of roads in Lake County this year under the \$100,000,000 road bond issue.  
He stated that the commission plans surfacing of Route 59 from Lehman's Corners to Antioch; Route 59 from Ingleside to junction of route 20 to Volo and Fox Lake; Route 176 from Mundelein west to junction of Iyanhoe and Wauconda state road. Work will be started early in spring he stated.  
The meeting was attended by about 25 members of the association with C. J. Herschberger as chairman. One of the features was the showing of a motion picture on road building.

#### ROAD DELEGATION ON VISITS TO SPRINGFIELD

#### Lake County Supervisors in Conference with Governor on Highway Prospects

Delegation from the Lake county board of supervisors were in Springfield last week where they went into conference with Gov. Len Small regarding possibilities of state road building in Lake county for 1927.  
Those who made the trip were Chairman Ray Paddock, Supervisors George Bairstow and William J. Obee, County Superintendent of Highways R. M. Lobdell and County Clerk Lew A. Hendee.  
They had two routes in mind that they hope the state will pave this spring. One is the continuation of Grand avenue, at Lehman's corners, near Fox Lake, to the Belvidere road to the south. This would bring the Wauconda-Mundelein road that would connect in at Crystal Lake, McHenry road in near Volo. The second is the that some inquiry may be made as to when the county will receive its county.  
The governor was asked if the state has any preferences in paving for Lake county under the \$100,000,000. If not these two routes will be suggested.

#### BANDIT ROBBS LOCAL MAN IN HIS GARAGE

#### Holds Up J. L. Loeb and Relieves Him of \$75 in Cash; Police Seek in Vain

Highland Park police searched this city last Thursday for an armed bandit who held up and robbed J. L. Loeb, 535 South Sheridan of \$75 in the latter's private garage early that day.  
Loeb told police that the bandit, whom he described as being six feet tall, was standing in the shadow of the garage and that as he stepped from his car the robber rushed up behind him pressed a revolver against his side and said, "Stick 'em up, kid."  
The thief then leisurely searched his victim, took the money and ran out of the garage. Loeb immediately ran to his home and notified the police. A network of guards was thrown about the city but no trace of the bandit was discovered.

#### PLAN TO PRESENT ENGLISH SINGERS

The Winnetka Music club is presenting "The English Singers" in its fourth concert in the current Artist-Recital series on Monday, Feb. 14. The group of singers is made up of three women and three men, who sing with carefree perfection, seated informally about a table, the club reports.  
Called back to England after a few performances, these singers in 1925 established a reputation which brings them back for a large number of concerts in 1926 and 1927. Their program will include several folksong arrangements and work of old composers from England, Italy, and France.

#### HIGHWOOD WOMAN IS RELEASED ON BOND

Marie Elliott Hickson, of Highwood, the mother of two children and wife of two army men at Fort Sheridan, who was held to the grand jury last week on a charge of bigamy and held for several days in the county jail was released in bonds later and while she was in court it was reported she had been starving herself in jail. Her bonds, \$3,000, were furnished by Joseph Oltusky of Waukegan.  
At the sheriff's office it was said that Mrs. Hickson had eaten but one full meal during her week in the county jail. She is said to have refused to eat or drink anything on some days, telling the jailers that she would rather starve to death than to stay in jail.
