GLENCOE PLANS TO BUILD WATER PLANT Buys Property and Will Build System Instead of Depending on Winnetka

Culminating months of endeavor on the part of real estate brokers and a special committee of the council, Merle B. Waltz, president of Glencoe, this week announced that the village had purchased the F. J. Woolley property at 69 Park avenue, Glencoe, for the erection of a water plant to enable the town to handle its own water distribution instead of having the village of Winnetka do so, as has been the case heretofore. The amount paid for the land was \$113,000.

Within the next week or so the Glencoe council is expected to pass a water ordinance which will provide for the construction of the plant building, and the various feeder pipes which will connect with the lake and the town water distribution system. The cost of this part of the project work which is to start in the spring, alone is expected to run well over \$175,000.

NOTED COMPOSER TO TALK TO STUDENTS Harold A. Loring to Give Recital on Indian Customs at High School
