An act for the conservation of certain wild plants in the state of Illinois, in force July 1, 1923. Enacted by the people of the state of Illinois.

represented in the general assembly: Any person, firm or corporation who shall, within the state of Illinois, knowingly buy, sell or offer or expose for sale any Bloodroot, Lady Slipper, Columbine, Trillium, Lotus or Gentian, or any part thereof, dug, pulled up or gathered from any public or private land, unless in the case of the private land the owner or person lawfully occupying such land gives his consent in writing therto, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall be punished by the fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and costs.
