BILL TO CONTROL FOX RIVER FLOW

A bill designed to bring about control of the flow of waters in the Fox river chain has been introduced in the state legislature by Representative William F. Weiss of Waukegan and bids fair to come up for passage at this session of the state legislature.

The measure will provide for the location of a dam in the river between Lake and McHenry counties near McHenry. This dam will tend to regulate the flow of the waters at all periods of the year but will be of especial value during the spring when freshets emptying their supplies of water into the Fox sends it rampaging on its way to the Illinois river.

The regulation of the flow of water is also expected to assure a greater depth of water in the chains of lakes north of the proposed dam.

Another feature in connection with the damming of the river at that point is the possibility of future development of water power by use of the obstruction to the flow of water at McHenry. Water power potentialities of the Fox river in that section have long been dismissed.

GOVES OPINION ON INSURANCE TAXES

The assessment of net receipts of foreign fire insurance companies at 100 per cent is invalid to the extent of 50 per cent thereof and a county clerk may properly reduce such assessments by this percentage. Attorney General Carlstrom has informed Russell Hanson, a state's attorney of LaSalle county.

Hanson asked the opinion when the board of review of LaSalle county assessed net receipts of foreign insurance companies 100 per cent. The attorney general based his decision on several Supreme court cases.
