

Louis, Ill., every inch of it being "embalmed." The pipe was first coated with paint, and then tapper with four-inch muslin, allowing approximately one inch for overlay. The pictures of King Tut give a graphic picture of the method followed. The engineers in charge of the construction of this main claim that the life of the pipe will be lengthened many years, and that it should give good service for one hundred years.

SOURCE OF GREAT WATERWAY SYSTEM

OF THE CENTRAL WEST

Mississippi-Missouri Chain Has Headwaters in Jefferson River Basin, Mont., Says Expert

The Mississippi-Missouri river system is one of the best known geographic features of the North American continent; it is the longest and one of the most important river channels in the world. This river system, including its tributaries, provides water supply for sustaining practically all of the commercial development in the interior plains of the United States and adjoining areas lying between the crest of the Rocky mountains on the west, the Appalachian Highlands on the east, the Canadian boundary on the north, and the Mississippi Delta on the Gulf of Mexico. The ultimate source of this enormous chain of waterways lies in the Jefferson river basin in Montana.

Discovered in 1805
This headwater area was discovered and named by the Lewis and Clark expedition, which reached the mouth of Jefferson river July 25, 1805. It was nearly 50 years later, however, before white settlers entered the region in large numbers, and they were miners attracted by the discovery of gold there in the early fifties. During the heyday of mining activity great fortunes in gold were won, and in this connection much has been told of lawlessness and the heroic measures that were employed by the law-abiding citizens for the protection of life and property. At Virginia City, Mont., there still remain as a grim reminder of those early days the graves of bandits executed by the vigilantes.

Today the Jefferson river basin has become a well-established agricultural region, although much of the land is rough mountain country of no agricultural value except for grazing. Here and there are broad open valleys and terraced benches that include large areas of tillable lands. The altitude of these lands ranges from 4,000 to 7,000 feet above sea level. At the higher altitudes, in general above 5,500 feet, the growing season is too short for diversified farm crops.

Variety of Crops
At the lower altitudes a considerable variety of crops can be grown but there the rainfall is ordinarily inadequate for successful crop production, and irrigation has therefore been practiced extensively. The total area now irrigated is about 426,000 acres, and plans have been made for extending the irrigation development to include 185,000 acres more. At the present time storage reservoirs having an aggregate capacity of 113,000 acre-feet are operated, in connection with irrigation for the most part, and government surveys have been made indicating that undeveloped sites having a potential storage capacity of 918,000 acre-feet are available for development.

There are also developed and undeveloped water-power sites in the region unduly.

Food for Thought
There is food for considerable thought in this statement. The American labor unions have long been marked for destruction by the communists in the United States and their Russian allies. Furnish Example
The strikes of the specific organizations mentioned above furnish an example of the results of such red activities. The reports state that the furriers strike committee expended approximately a million dollars, or more than twice the amount so expended in the great steel strike of 1919. And in the furriers strike there is said to be a deficit of a half million at this time which the leaders are seeking to make up through assessment of the members of the union. Both of the big needle strikes, it is said could have been avoided, and in the furriers strike it is claimed that there was an irregularity in the strike referendum. The charge is that the radical minority which controlled the referendum insisted on demands which it knew could not be secured, and so forced the strike.

Inspired by Radicals
It is to be remembered that these strikes, which cost the workers so much in loss of wages and left their organizations in serious financial situations were inspired and engineered by the radicals of the organizations who are known to have sympathy with the red movement.

There is small wonder then that there has been a great reaction in the organization against the communists. The workers are finding that red leadership is costly to everyone, as costly to the workers themselves as to their employes.

WARREN TOWNSHIP SUES FOR DAMAGE

Seeks \$10,000 in Case of Employee Injured in 1923 in Auto Crash

Trial of a \$10,000 damage suit in which the Town of Warren is the plaintiff and James Callahan owner of Callahan Dairy company of Waukegan is defendant, started last week in the circuit court of Judge Claire C. Edwards.

It is charged that Ernest Johnson, an employe of the Town of Warren, on a road construction job on Nov. 28, 1923, was hurled from a grader and permanently injured when a machine operated by John Callahan, now deceased, hit the tractor.

The bill states that the Industrial Commission awarded Johnson \$995 for compensation accrued; \$44.50 for medical and surgical aid; weekly payments of \$14 a week for 267 weeks starting on April 15, 1925; and a pension thereafter of \$25 a month for the balance of his life.

The Town of Warren under the Workman's Compensation Act is compelled to make these payments to Johnson, this causing the suit to be instituted against Callahan.

MUCH MONEY SPENT IN NEW BUILDINGS

More than \$11,000,000 worth of buildings for the use of college students have been added to the campuses of Chicago's two universities in the year 1926, reports from the two centers show. Chicago university's Midway campus has been enriched by five new structures, valued at \$5,450,000, while Northwestern university's down-town campus has been completed at a cost of approximately \$6,000,000.

ENTIRELY NEW LINE OF CHEVROLET CARS

Many Improvements Are Added Says Announcement of Company January First

RELIGIOUS CENSUS RESULTS ARE GIVEN

Tells Per Centage at Different Periods Since 1800; Gradual Increase

A recent religious census of the nation has been taken with the help of the newspapers. It shows that in 1800 the Protestant church members numbered 7 per cent of the population; in 1850, 15 per cent; in 1870, 17 per cent; in 1880, 20 per cent; in 1900 24 per cent; in 1910, 24 per cent; in 1925, approximately 26 per cent. Statistics for the Roman Catholic, Greek Catholic, and Jewish churches are not so definite, but they indicate that the

total church membership in the United States numbers about 43 per cent of the entire population. Counting out the children who are below the age of church membership the churches actually contain about 51 per cent of the available population in their membership.

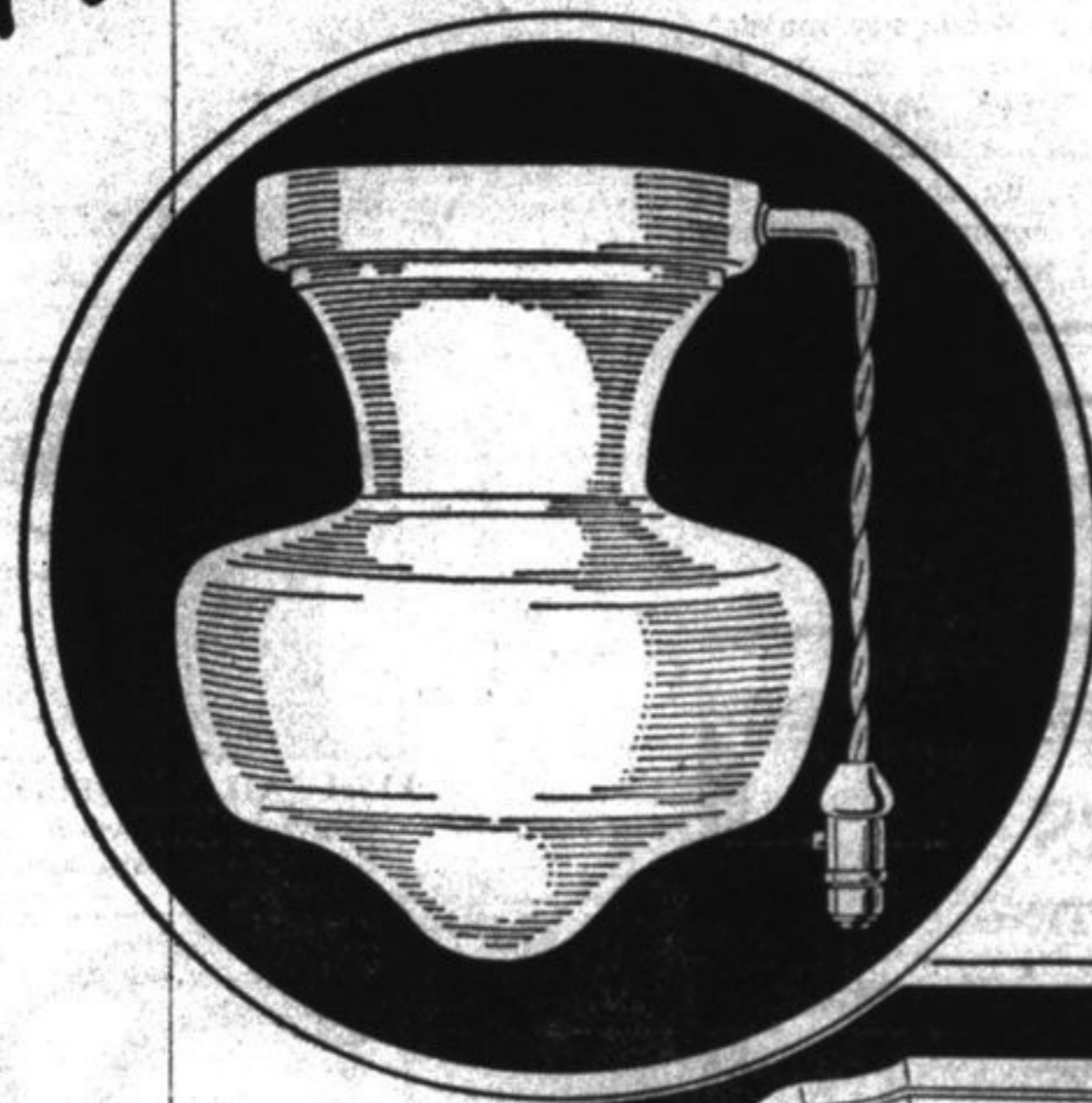
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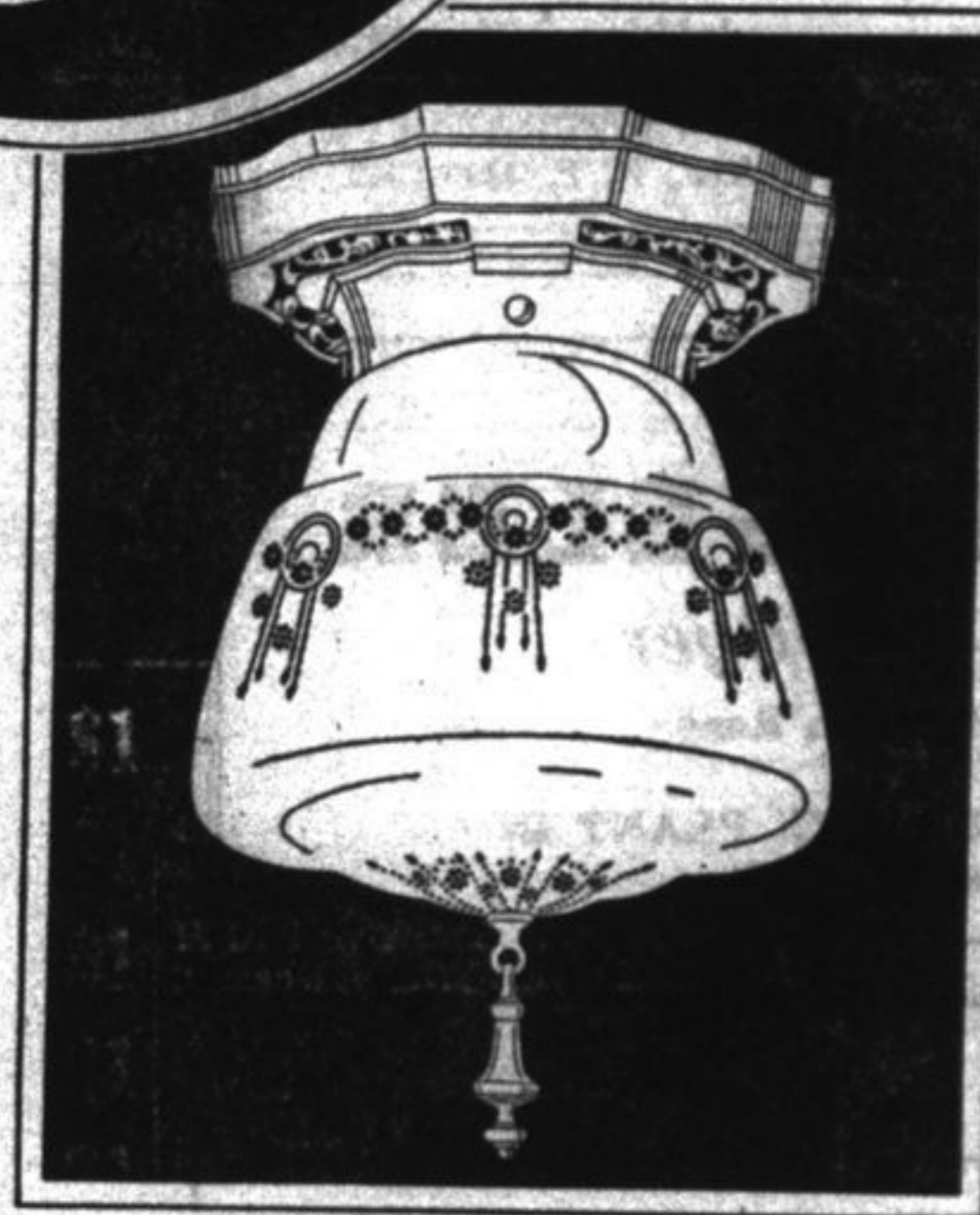
