

LAKE RISES FIRST TIME IN WINTER

EXPECT FURTHER GAINS

Engineers Point Out That Nature Is Supporting Claim of Chicago to Water; Details Given

Fulfillment of predictions that the levels of the great lakes are entering upon a cumulative upward movement are revealed by sanitary district engineers from December hydrographic charts.

The charts show, according to Engineers Phillip J. Farrington and H. S. Ripley, that nature is bending backward to recover from the gradual lowering of the last nine years and the sudden drop of 1925.

For the first time in the recorded history of lake levels Mr. Ripley pointed out, there has been an upward instead of a downward movement in December. The rise is not great, varying from .18 foot in Ontario to .04 in Huron, but it is significant, the engineers report.

Greater Rise Expected

Lake levels reach their peak in mid-summer and fall to their lowest level in the winter. The average difference is about one foot. This season's cycle has been phenomenal, Mr. Ripley said, because the drop this year from the summer high to the winter low has been only .4 foot. Furthermore, he said, that lake experts are optimistic believing that the crescendo phase for this year has begun and will exceed even the 1925 rise which was abnormally great. There is no longer any doubt that the alarming depletion of 1925 was only a temporary disturbance, Mr. Ripley said.

The story as revealed on the hydrographic charts since 1861 brought up to date by the December records was outlined by Mr. Ripley. In the summer of 1917 the lakes reached the highest peak since 1909. Between those years there had been a falling and then a rising cycle. Since 1861 that experience has been typical running in about nine-year periods.

Low Record in 1925

After 1917 the lake levels fell gradually until in the winter of 1925 in what at the time seemed an alarming drop, the lakes reached their record low stage.

Then, the pendulum swung back. Last summer's advance of fifteen inches exceeded the normal increase by three inches. Now, with the unprecedented rise in December after a seasonal drop of only .4 foot instead of one foot, engineers are hopeful that the levels will continue to advance according to past experience, to reach a peak in 1931.

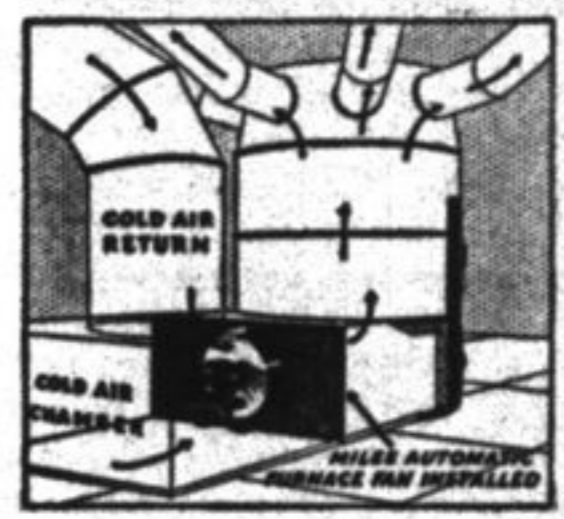
