The rector has chosen for his topic next Sunday morning at the eleven o'clock service "Preliminary Training." He has taken for his text I Cor. IX:24-27 and will draw upon modern athletics as illustrations of St. Paul's meaning.

Washington's Birthday Dinner  
The father of our country was an Episcopalian and a vestryman for eleven years. During that period the vestry held 31 meetings at 23 of which George Washington is recorded as being present. His rector says of him, "I never knew so constant an attendant on church as Washington, and his behavior in the House of God was ever so deeply reverent that it produced the happiest effect upon my congregation and greatly assisted me in my pulpit labors."

The men of Trinity parish will hold this dinner on his birthday in commemoration of the father of our country.

The Bishop's Crusade  
Trinity parish will participate in the Bishop's Crusade by attendance upon the services and meetings to be held in St. Luke's church, Evanston, on February 16, 17 and 18. The Girls' choir will participate in the children's service at 4:00 p. m. on Friday, Feb. 18. It is expected that many groups will attend the other sessions. Reports from all over the country show a great interest and enthusiasm for the Crusade as the movement gathers headway. The rector has been invited to serve as a Crusader in Rockford on the 14th, 15th and 16th.

The exact date of the public services for Trinity parish has not yet been set, but it is contemplated to arrange these meetings and services around the first week in Lent. The general public will be invited to attend.

The Rector's Bible Class  
Plans are under way for the formation of an adult Bible class, the first meeting of which will be held Friday, Feb. 25. The rector will give a series of ten lectures which will be followed by discussion. Membership is open to all. Both the Bible class and the men's dinner have particular bearing upon the Bishop's Crusade.

### Christian Science

"Spirit" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, February 6.

The Golden Text was from II Cor. 3:18, "We all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord."

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit into Galilee: and there went out a fame of him through all the region round about. And there was delivered unto him the book of the prophet Esaias. And when he had opened the book, he found the place where it was written, The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised" (Luke 4:14, 17-18).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The senses of Spirit abide in Love, and they demonstrate Truth and Life. Hence Christianity and the Science which expounds it are based on spiritual understanding, and they supersede the so-called laws of matter. Jesus demonstrated this great verity" (p. 274).

### OIL BURNER AND CAR HAVE SIMILARITIES

Vic J. Killian, inc., plumbing, heating and oil burning engineers, are making an interesting comparison between the Aetna Automatic oil burner and the automobile, as follows: The Aetna oil burner has motor, drive shaft and oil pump and all working parts run in oil, same as an auto. The burner's air adjustment corresponds to the choke of the auto; the oil adjustment of the burner to the carburetor of the car; the combustion chamber of the burner to the cylinder head of the auto, and the rear-end atomization to the rear wheel of the car. The burner is a natural draft burner which makes it very quiet, Mr. Killian says.

Mr. Killian also is handling a new Consolidated triple service boiler, which has the features of heat, domestic hot water, and incineration all in one unit. Should one install an oil burner in the boiler, the compartment for incineration may be used with coal if so desired.

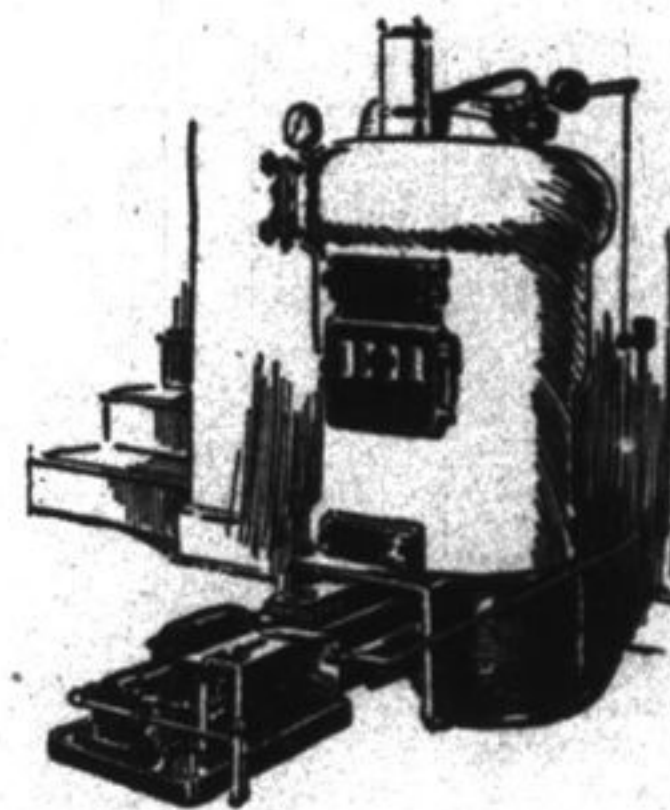
