The Highland Park East Park District Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the Board of Commissioners of the Highland Park East Park District, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered the condemnation for use as a public park all of lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 16, and 17, block 6, Wrenn's Addition, all in Highland Park, Ill., by the said The Highland Park East Park District, and that the said real estate be improved for use as a public park by plowing, grading, levelling, discing, dragging, seeding, raking, rolling, covering with straw, constructing a water sprinkler system with connection in present meter pit, including new meter, valve, and necessary fittings furnished by the City of Highland Park on receipt of permit fee; including the furnishing and setting of sprinkler hydrants, including planting of shrubs and removal of existing fence, and including the cost of engineering services, all in said Highland Park East Park District, Lake County, Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the Secretary of said Highland Park East Park District, and having applied to the County Court of Lake county for the condemnation of said property for said use and for an assessment thereof of having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the Eighth (8th) day of March, A. D. 1927, or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit.

Said assessment is payable in ten (10) installments, with interest at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum on all installments from and after the date of issue of first voucher.
