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CAMOUFLAGED RADICALISM

"Is there a real menace in radicalism" asks Joseph T. Cashman in the current issue of the National Republic. Mr. Cashman then answers the question himself in an interesting article in which he declares that the clever and misleading camouflage with which the reds mask their propaganda, forms the principle menace in their activities and constitutes the chief menace in combating it.

"The menace of radicalism arises from the objectives of radicalism," Mr. Cashman continues. "By radicalism is meant socialism or communism, and their allied groups, such as the Non-Partisan League, the Workers' Party, the Farmer Labor Party, the Conference for Progressive Political Action, the Trade Union Educational League, the American Civil Liberties Union, the League for Industrial Democracy and many other pacifist, political, social and economic organizations with ntrngung, high-sounding and often misleading names.

These misleading names are part of the clever propaganda methods of the socialists and their "I-am-not-a-Socialist-But" allies. Thus, who would suspect the Conference for Progressive Political Action to be a disguise for the Socialist Party? Yet that disguise of the wolf in shepe's clothing won over 5,000,000 votes for their presidential candidate in 1924.

Who would suspect the Non-Partisan League of being a part of the Socialist Party? Yet that is the name under which A. C. Townley, Arthur Le Seur, and other Socialists captured the state of North Dakota, introduced socialism there in banking, agriculture and big enterprises, took off the debt limit of the state and, after a colossal failure, all but bankrupted the state and in the face of that cataclysm it still wields a great influence in many states in the northwest. The Farmer-Labor Party is only another name for the Socialists, because of the Non-Partisan League's failure in North Dakota.

HIGHLAND PARK IS GROWING RAPIDLY

Highland Park's growth last year, as indicated by the number of new telephones installed, was described by Mr. E. A. Judd, manager of the local exchange recently.

FINES AND JAIL FOR TWO ILLEGAL VOTERS

This Makes Three of Those Implicated in Highland Park Case; Others

Pleading guilty two more laborers in the vote frauds at Highland Park Dec. 13, last week were sentenced to 10 days in the county jail by Judge P. L. Persons in the county court. In addition they were assessed fines of \$100 each.

They were Audrey Mazurek and J. W. Gallagher. Both are aliens but they voted on the bond issues espoused by the Highland Park administration last December. One man was sent to jail previously for the same number of days.

This leaves eight more cases to hear. I. G. Lain, nephew of I. D. Lain, of the construction company bearing his name, is among these defendants. All have pleaded not guilty to illegal voting as they claim that they are citizens and residents of Highland Park.

These cases have been set for March 1, according to States Attorney A. V. Smith, who assisted in the investigation of the frauds.
